FATAL RUNOFF ON THE G. T. R.

About Two Miles East of Delhi Station.

Driver Frank Bowen Instantly Killed
Fireman and Brakeman Badly Hurt—Eight Cars Wrecked.

[Special to The Advertiser per G.N.W.] Delhi, Ont., July 7.—West-bound train No. 89, engine No. 67, was wrecked at 1:45 this morning about two miles east of this station. Driver Frank Bowen was instantly killed. His body was found lying between the engine and tender covered with ties.

Fireman Perry and Brakeman Hildison were badly hurt. Conductor Griffin and another brakeman, who were in the back coach, escaped unhurt.

The engine cab was completely demolished, and the remainder of the engine was hurled into the ditch upside down. The tender turned completely over, and four cars were piled up in front of the engine and four behind, all being completely demolished. The track was torn to pieces. The cause of the accident is unknown. The condition of the track shows that something had dragged for nearly half a mile.

Bowen lived at Bridgeburg, and leaves a wife and family.

When the crew which was left unhurt found Fireman Perry, he exclaimed: "Never mind me! Find my mate."

Dr. R. B. Wells attended the wounded, and reports them as in a favorable condition. An inquest is not deemed necessary.

THE GROOM SKIPPED IN GOOD TIME.

Hamilton, July 7.—T. A. Martin, of Stoney Creek, a married man with ten children and a wife, residing in the latter village, and who has been employed in the city for some time as an insurance agent, was to have been married to Miss Nellie Stewart at her parents' home in this city on Wednesday, and the friends of the bride-to-be only heard of Martin's history and previous marriage an hour before the ceremony was to have been performed. The groom denied the story, but took the first opportunity to skip out, and has not been seen since.

Everett Versus London.

The Free Press, in coming once more to Mr. Everett's defense, thinks it makes a point against The Advertiser, by saying that while Canada needs all the foreign capital it can get, The Advertiser "denounces as a public enemy any owner of capital living away from the city who has a large investment here."

The Advertiser has done no such thing, and Mr. Everett's organ knows it. We do not recall anyone who has termed Mr. Everett "a public enemy"; but it would puzzle a Philadelphia lawyer to point out any respect whatever in which he has been London's friend.

For an American millionaire to bring his capital into Canada to develop our natural resources, is one thing; to bring his capital into Canada merely to gobble up the control of our London street railway charter, is quite another. At no time has London been dependent on Mr. Everett for street railway facilities.

Mr. Everett did not go into the London Street Railway as an act of philanthropy. He did not go into it even as a permanent investment. The way Mr. Everett has made much of his wealth has been by organizing companies, watering the stock and appropriating big slices in the stock-jobbing operations involved.

The London Street Railway stock was duly watered; but not, it is true, to the full extent intended by Mr.

Everett, as it was found the Ontario Legislature interposed a limit.

We are aware there are local holders of stock who have been holders for a long time, and who are not fairly to be held responsible for Mr. Everett's actions, as controlling shareholder, and we are sure our citizens have no desire they should suffer loss. They are not, however, in control; and probably the only thing they can do might be to advise Mr. Everett that more money would be made by working with, rather than against, public opinion.

As to Mr. Everett himself, the final controller of the street railway corporation, he came into it with no sentimental feelings of friendliness to London, but solely from the standpoint of a stock jobber; and therefore while London owes him fair play, indeed, it is not called on to fail abjectly at his feet.

The Advertiser has for Mr. Everett not so much as an atom of personal ill-feeling. Personally it does not know him from Adam. But Mr. Everett, if he will think it over, must admit it has a very anomalous look, that a state of war, on a small scale, should be going on in a Canadian city, between good citizens and good British subjects on the one hand, and a Cleveland millionaire on the other.

The situation is an impossible one, and cannot be permitted to continue. Mr. Everett can terminate it by a word.

Cecil No Party to the Transvaal Controversy.

British Liberals Capture Two Seats in Oldham.

Mrs. Sewall, President of the Women's International Congress.

Explanation From Mr. Chamberlain—China Rejects the Proposed Alliance With Japan—Wholesale Poisoning.

London, July 7.—The German Review (Berlin) prints a series of conversations of Cecil Rhodes, in the course of which he says that, in the interest of his African undertakings, he has done all he could to influence the British Government in favor of the German proposals on the Samoan question. He declares his intention to hold entirely aloof from the Transvaal controversy and to "leave the government to have it out with Kruger on their own responsibility."

He repudiates the suggestion that he is in favor of using force toward the Transvaal, saying: "I once made that mistake, and it was enough for me."

PEACE LIKELY TO PREVAIL.

It is reported from Cape Town and Bloemfontein that the franchise proposals accepted by the Pretoria conference will grant the franchise immediately to residents who have been in the country since 1890, and to others after five years' residence from the date of the new law. The proposals will also give Johannesburg five representatives in the Volksraad.

The special conference between President Kruger, the members of the cabinet, Fischer, a member of the executive council of the Orange Free State, who was bearer of compromise suggestions from the Free State in the matter of dispute between the Transvaal and Great Britain, and Hofmeyer, the Afrikaner leader, has been practically concluded. It is believed that the franchise proposals have been accepted, and that peace will be preserved.

LIBERAL GAINS.

London, July 7.—The Liberal party gained two parliamentary seats yesterday in the bye-elections held to fill the dual vacancy created in Oldham by the death last month of Mr. Robert Ashcroft, Conservative, and the subsequent resignation of his Conservative colleague, Mr. James Francis Oswald. Results: Mr. Alfred Emmett, Liberal, 12,976; Walter Rumlumman, Liberal, 12,770; Winston Churchill, Conservative, 11,448. Messrs. Oswald and Ashcroft at the time of their election, polled respectively 12,465 and 13,085 Conservative votes. Yesterday's election therefore is a distinct Conservative reverse. Mr. Alfred Emmett is a wealthy cotton spinner of Oldham. He is a cousin of J. Emmet Barlow, Liberal, of the Free division of Somersetshire. His brother married Lady Constance Campbell, daughter of the Duke of Argyll. Mr. Walter Rumlumman is also a local man. He is 29 years of age, and a son of Mr. Walter Rumlumman of Newcastle.

An election was held in the Osgood Cross division, west riding of Yorkshire. Sir John Austin, Liberal Home Ruler, who had resigned his seat in the House of Commons owing to differences with the Liberal Association, was re-elected over Mr. Roberts, Independent Liberal, by 2,925 majority. At the general parliamentary election in July, 1895, Sir John Austin received 5,119 votes, and M. J. Harding, the Conservative candidate, received 4,654 votes.

Mr. Joseph Chamberlain made a personal statement in the House of Commons.

POISONED BY SAUSAGES.

Berlin, July 6.—Nineteen families have been poisoned by smoked sausage in the village of Ingbert, in the Prussian province of Saxony. The case of Herr Heinrich, the burgomaster, it proved fatal.

He died so suddenly that it was thought at first that he had succumbed to heart disease. It was found later, though, that he had made a hearty meal of the poisoned sausage.

Of the nineteen families who partook of the sausage, fifty men, women and children are dangerously ill.

The authorities are making a thorough investigation in the village sausage factory, but thus far the nature of the poison has not been ascertained.

JAPS MUST BE GENTLEMEN.
