Driver Frank Bowen Instantly Killed Fireman and Brakeman Badly Hurt-Eight Cars Wrecked.

[Special to The Advertiser per G.N.W.] Delhi, Ont., July 7.-West-bound train No. 89, engine No. 67, was wrecked at 1:45 this morning about two miles east of this station. PACIFIC CABLE British Government Agrees to Carry Out Original Arrangement. Amendment to the G. T. R. Agreement Bill Decided Upon by Opposition Senators,

> [C. P. R. Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, July 7 .- The Dominion Government has been advised by Mr. Joseph Chamberlain that the imperial government will contribute its share, as originally suggested, to the Pacific cable project. The original arrangement was that Australia and New Zealand would contribute eight-eighteenths of the cost of the Pacific cable,

Canada at first thought that this was more than her share, seeing that the scheme was an imperial one, and Britain then refused to do anything peyond granting a subsidy equal to its share, when a joint interest was all along contemplated. British Columbia came aroused over the fact that though a shareholder in the Niger Company, he had voted in favor of the transfer of Mr. Chamberlain says that Britain will contribute its share, as originally proposed, and will take an interest in the project along with the other colonies. Indeed, the result of it all has been that Britain may go a little further than it was asked to do in the first in-

stance. The committee opposition senators appointed to prepare an amendment to the Grand Trunk agreement bill met this morning. It is understood that they agreed on an amendment, which will be moved by Mr. Bowell today in the senate. The amendment, in effect, will provide that the traffic arrangement can be terminated by the minister of railways, after three months' notice to the G. T. R. Hon. David Mills' amendment is one year's notice.
