THIS DISTRICT HARD HIT BY ALTERATIONS IN TRAIN SCHEDULES

Popular Trains Cancelled Will Cause Inconvenience.

MAIL SERVICE AFFECTED

And Short Trips North Will Now Require Two Days.

As the result of a conference of transportation officials held in Toronto on Sunday last, at which it was decided to cancel 25 C.P.R. and 24 G.T.R. passenger trains. The following cancellation and changes in times of trains in and out of the city become effective on Sunday next at midnight:

Train No. 256—Now leaving London for Toronto at 9:30 a.m. will be cancelled.

Train No. 17—Now leaving London for Detroit at 4:25 a.m. will be cancelled.

Train No. 115—Now leaving London for Detroit at 11:35 a.m. will be cancelled.

Train No. 161—Now leaving London at 3:30 a.m. for Wingham will be cancelled.

Train No. 11—Now leaving London for Windsor at 5:35 p.m. will leave at 2:40 p.m.

Train No. 166—Now leaving London for Stratford at 7:20 a.m. will be cancelled.

Train No. 164—Now arriving London from Wingham at 6:15 p.m. will be cancelled.

Train No. 144—Now arriving London from Detroit at 4:00 p.m. will be cancelled.

Train No. 171—Now arriving London from Stratford at 1:45 p.m. will be cancelled.

Train No. 27—Now arriving London from Toronto and Stratford at 11:05 p.m. will arrive at 11:15 p.m.

The cancellation of the eight G.T.R. trains which have a direct effect upon the city will, railway officials of this district claim, greatly disarrange travelling and have a bad effect on mails on certain divisions.

On the Huron and Bruce line the removal of the morning train will mean that people along this line will be deprived of their morning papers and this branch, feeding a large district, cannot be touched from any other source. It will now be impossible to get north as far as Clam Lake, only 27 miles from the city, and back the same day.

The afternoon train which leaves for Wingham at 4:40 o'clock will carry the first mail north to a populous district that has received two mails a day each way for years past.

With only one train each way on this branch line, regarded as the Grand Trunk's best paying proposition in Western Ontario, the towns along this route, it is expected, will strongly protest against the change.

The removal of the morning train to Stratford will seriously affect mails and travelling.

The Ontario Limited for Toronto which departs at 9:00 a.m. and the 11:35 a.m. train for Detroit have been heavily laden trains every day and their removal takes away two of the road's best passenger trains out of the city.

The new time table is expected to reach the city on Wednesday night, or Thursday and until its arrival it is not known what connections can be made with trains on other divisions.

The local changes on the C.P.R. have not yet been sent out by the head office, but will reach here, it is expected, in the course of a day or two.

SIR WM. RALPH MEREDITH JOINS ASSOCIATED KIN HERE

McElroy, who is active in the organization, saying that it would be impossible for him to speak at such a gathering owing to his double bereavement, the loss of his son and his sister, but in an entire sympathy with the objects of the association, and am glad to become a member. Mr. McElroy was deeply grateful to Sir William, and states that the check covers the membership of many soldiers' wives who should and will belong to it. Since the meeting of Sunday evening, a large number of new members have been added to the organization.

MAYOR REFUSES TO PAY OVERDRAFT FOR TRUST

POTATOES IN BRITAIN CHEAPER THAN IN CITY

Comparison of Maximum Prices in Old Land and Ruling Prices Here.

In view of the fact that Baron Devonport, food controller in Britain, has fixed the prices which growers may charge for wheat, oats and potatoes, it may be of interest to note how these prices compare with those charged for similar products in this city.

For wheat the British high limit is 60 shillings for 504 pounds, or \$1.71 a bushel. Here it is \$1.50 for new and \$1.40 for old.

Oats in the old land may not cost more than 38 shillings and 6 pence for 336 pounds, or \$1.74 for 100 pounds. Here the price is \$2.05 for 100 pounds.

Potatoes in England must not exceed 120 shillings per ton (of 2,240 pounds) or \$1.25 per bag. Here the price is \$2.25 per bag.

CAR TRIES TO GO TWO DIRECTIONS AT SAME TIME

Front Trucks Head Eastward While Rear Ones Run South.
