COURT-MARTIAL RULES.

District orders issued today contain special instructions regarding the disposition of courts-martial. The time between the arrest of a soldier and the application for a court-martial is limited to 72 hours. If the delay is greater than this, a special report must be submitted with the application, explaining the cause of delay.

On the other hand 48 hours only are permitted between the receipt of the application for a court-martial, and the order for its assembly, and 72 hours between the issue of the order for the court-martial and the assembly of the court. COURT-MARTIAL RULES.
