

As expikers had picketed the mills during the opening hours. After they gathered and formed a column for a parade.

At the head of the line, according to City Marshal O'Brien, who observed the preparations through a heavy fog, were red flags. He summoned reserves from police headquarters and then read the riot act to the crowd. Called upon to disperse, the gathering held its ground, and from the outskirts stones and bottles were thrown.

Shots were fired from a house, but no one was hit. Officers forced their way through the crowd and arrested all occupants of the building. Meantime other policemen and strike sympathizers mixed in a melee, in which many were injured. Officers' clubs struck down several in the crowd, and two officers were hit by stones or bottles. Twenty-two arrests were made, nearly all on charges of inciting to riot.

Paris, March 18.—The fortifications on the Island of Helgoland, Germany's formidable base in the North Sea, must be dismantled. This decision was reached today by the supreme Allied

It was decided also that the Kiel Canal should be internationalized, and may be available to the ships of all nations on even terms. Tolls will be collected to pay for the maintenance of the canal. Germany probably will retain sovereignty of the waterway. The council has under consideration the question of maintaining Helgoland as a port of refuge for peaceful craft.
