Jealous of every man that looked at her." he said.



Tomorrow-Alice in Distress. RAILROAD IS CHIEF **ASSET OF DOMINION** PERMANENT LOAN CO.

Assignee Clarkson Makes Report To Ontario Attorney-General.

TORONTO, June 8 .- Reporting to the attorney-general's department on the financial status of the Dominion Permanent Loan Company, which is being wound up, E. R. C. Clarkson & Sons, assignees, state that the assets of the company consist almost wholly of the company consist almost wholly of a railroad in the state of Washington, which "was constructed in an extravagant manner," and which the liquidators have been unable to dispose of to other railway organizations; of claims against directors for alleged misfeasance; claims against stockholders for repayment of dividends; claims against stockholders on what is known as "prepaid stock" also on what is known as "provincial loan company stock"; an interest in the town site of Grand Forks, B. C.; claims against the directors in connection with the purchase of the Provincial Loan Company; certain real estate and mortgages, and certain real estate and mortgages, and a claim against the Canadian Pacific Railway, in connection with the con-struction of a railroad in British Co-

Subject to Litigation.
G. T. Clarkson of Clarkson & Sons adds in a letter: "You will see that the assets of the company consist almost entirely of the railroad—which is most difficult to deal with—and claims which are subject matter of litigation."

The Clarkson report has been made is a result of inquiries made during he recent session of the Legislature by the members from North and South

Waterloo.

Most Important Asset.

Referring to the railroad in Washington in detail, the report states that this property constitutes the most important asset of the company, and appeared on its books at over \$4,000,000, after credit had been given for upwards of \$1,000,000 paid to the company in connection with certain bonuses for the construction of railroads in British Columbia.

"So far as can be ascertained, the railroad, had it been economically constructed, should not have cost, all told, over \$1,000,000, when bonuses received ought to have been sufficient to have largely wiped out such cost," the report says, and extravarance in construction and operation is charged.

Altogether, the report is of a somewhat discouraging nature.

Increase of Scholars.

The report of the religious education presented by Rev. J. F. Knight showed within the conference 420 Sunday schools, a decrease of 9: 56,235 scholars, an increase of 463; missionary contributions, \$13,310 and total offerings from all sources, \$77,649, an increase over last year of \$5.486; 4,288 members were added to the church from Sunday schools and young people's societies.

Rev. B. Hicks, secretary, gave the sustentation fund report, which showed that the fund had been generously supported, all claims met and the total requests for assistance had been reduced one-third below last year. One district had ceased to ask for assistance. The total receipts of the fund were \$4988.29, of which \$2,190.60 had been issued. Increase of Scholars.




