Illicit Whiskey Business at the Border Has Reached Huge Proportions—Citizens Plan To Petition Ottawa To Take Prompt Action.

Windsor, July 12.-Close investigations which are being made here indicate that at the present time rum runners are disposing of liquor which nets them \$100,000 a day. Almost all of the whiskey goes into Michigan, and the business is reaching such magnitude that stringent action is required to put an end to it. Many of the best citizens are urging that a stiff jail sentence is the only way to stop the illicit traffic, and contemplate sending petitions to the government asking that prompt action be taken.

The rum traffic has developed so extensively that it is difficult to tell who Wanderer shot and killed his wife and may be involved. There have been some rather startling disclosures, and more are likely to follow shortly. At the present time the express companies are handling from one to three carloads of whiskey a day. Last week the seizures amounted to more than 1,000 cases, and this, it is stated, is only a small fraction of what is going through.

St. Catharines, July 12.-For the second time in the history of the Welland Canal a downbound steamer yesterday smashed through the footgates of a lock ancient and improved manner, with all into the level below. Six years ago the Cherokee performed a similar feat. Yesterday it was the same craft, which now hears the name, Maple Grove, owned by the Canada Steamship Lines. The steamer which carried a full load of wheat, entered Lock No. 2 cautiously When near the footgates, the captain signalled for a reverse of the engines to check the craft. Instead, the engineer began to work full speed, and she literally sprang into the footgates, which though wedged and mitred against her, were crunched off by the heavily laden iron craft, which plunged eighteen feet into the level below. With her speed accelerated by the rush of released water the boat raced towards No. 1 loci, at the end of the short level
