## Note and Comment

Usual interest is taken by the fight fans in the visit of Jim Jeffries to Toronto from the fact that there is a divided opinion as to his ability to meet Jack Johnson. After watching the bout with Sam Berger and a talk with the referee, Jeffries is still about 30 pounds too heavy, scaling at present 235 pounds, and his 34 years should prove no handicap to a proper return to form by a long course of gradual training, in which he is now gradually entering in his exhibition tour.

Last night Jeffries' only weakness was his short wind. He puffed too freely at skipping the rope and his boxing exercise.

Big Rob Day was an interested spectator of the exhibition and he came away enthusiastic over the work of the champion. It will be remembered that Mr. Day boxed Johnson on the latter's visit to Toronto two winters ago, and the amateur champion only needs to put the gloves on with Jeffries to get the perfect fight on the pair. Still he is satisfied that the white man will beat the black if he meets him. Day and Jeffries may meet again in a private fight some time today or tomorrow.

A noted difference between Jeffries and Johnson is their foot work, which is all in favor of the former, who moves around lightly on his toes while Tommy Burns' conqueror is notoriously flat-footed.

Sam Berger is now manager for Jeffries and will handle the approaching exhibition with the Johnson camp. The boxer was raised in Toronto, he was born in Chicago.
