

Chicago Wheat Market Narrow Sentiment Continues Bearish

Dull Session in Wheat Pit, Closing Slightly Easier — Winnipeg Dull — Liverpool Cables Weaker.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, Nov. 2. Liverpool wheat futures closed to-day 1/4 cent lower than yesterday; corn futures closed 1/4 cent lower. Chicago December wheat options closed 1/4 cent lower than yesterday; December oats 1/4 cent lower, and December oats 1/4 cent lower than yesterday; November oats 1/4 cent higher. Chicago car lots to-day: Wheat, 85, contract 85; corn 24, contract 12; oats 23, contract 80. Visible Supply. European visible wheat, decrease 2,884,000, against 4,800,000 bushels previous week, and a decrease of 1,800,000 bushels last year.

Crop Report. B. W. Snow's report of corn crop for Nov. 1 is based upon bushing results at 28 bushels per acre, which, on the basis of his estimate of an average of 103,750,000, makes a total crop of 3,410,000,000. Last year the crop was similarly estimated at 2,410,000,000. The best increases in yields are in the corn, where the decline is reported in condition during the last six weeks of the crop period were most severe. Iowa, Illinois, Wisconsin, and Indiana are reported about normal. Conditions for germination and growth have been generally favorable, and there is every prospect that the crop will go into winter quarters with fully normal promise.

Foreign Crop Summary. J. P. Bickell & Co. furnish the following Broomhall weekly crop summary: United Kingdom—The weather continues to be unfavorable for the timing of harvesting or further planting of the new crop. Argentina—The weather continues very favorable and there are no further reports of local damage. London firm is making an estimate of the exportable surplus this season, which places the total at 12,000,000 bushels. India—Both the weather and crop outlook are favorable. Australia—Cable from our agent in New South Wales states that general rains have fallen and the prospects for the season are much improved. Up to this time the reports have been excellent. Canada—There have been heavy rains, which have hindered sowing operations. The quality of deliveries of native wheat is satisfactory, much of it is damp. Germany—Sowing of the new crop is in progress. Exporting conditions are poor outlook for wheat, but some improvement is now noted. Romania—Sowing of the new crop is about finished and the outlook is favorable. Supplies, however, are scarce. Russia—Rains are reported to do so to confirm every poor outlook for winter wheat, both in the southwest and centre. The recent rains reported for the Punjab, arrivals from the interior to the ports continue large. Italy and Spain—The wheat already sown shows a good start. Offerings of native wheat are very scarce. North Africa—Beneficial rains have fallen.

ST. LAWRENCE MARKET. Receipts of farm produce were light, only 100 bushels of grain and 20 loads of hay. Wheat—One hundred bushels sold at 82c to 82c. Twenty loads sold at \$15 to \$22 per ton for timothy, and \$9 to \$10 for clover.

Receipts at northwest points were liberal and promise to continue so. Local quotations for western wheat were down 1/4 to 1/2 cent, and 1/4 cent for oats. There was no change in corn grains.
