RECOMMENDATIONS MADE BY THE BOARD OF HEALTH

Increases in Salary and Additional Officials—Verdict of Coroner's Jury in Millar Death.

HAMILTON, Jan. 24.—(Special).—Before the board of health this evening, William Farrar charged that the city council had taken over the collection of garbage so that the alder would have the patronage. Dr. Roberts, the medical health officer, was recommended for an increase from \$1800 to \$2500 a year, with the right to engage in private practice, and the sanitary inspectors were recommended for increases from \$600 to \$720. Another sanitary inspector, a plumbing inspector and an expert food inspector were recommended. The sum of \$700 was placed in the estimates for a laboratory, so that Dr. Roberts may test the milk and water supply. Thos. Crooks was re-elected chairman.

Coroner McNichol opened an inquest this afternoon into the death of Mrs. Samuel Sweet, 120 Rebecca-street, an inmate of the Hamilton Asylum, who Sunday evening set fire to her clothing. The enquiry was adjourned until Wednesday evening.

Robert Glasford left his horse tied to a post on James-street this evening and three minutes later he came back his steed had disappeared.

Rev. J. Aspinall McCuaig, New York, gave an address this evening in the First Congregational Church on the "Responsibilities of the Home."

The coroner's jury that investigated the death of James Millar, who was found dead in the cells at No. 3 police station a week ago Sunday, brought a verdict of accidental death. The evidence showed that he had fallen on the sidewalk and sustained injuries from which he died. The jury recommended an hourly inspection of prisoners in the cells.

The 13th Regiment band held a banquet in the armory this evening. Mrs. Smith, who was paying a visit to her son on Grant-avenue, died suddenly to-night.

A Lower Tax Rate.

Controller Bailey announces himself in favor of a reduction in the tax rate to 20 mills.

The Trades and Labor Council, which wants a fair wage clause inserted in the contracts for the erection of city buildings, will be given a hearing Friday evening.

Edward Hayes has withdrawn his application for a pool room license, and has applied for the position of sanitary inspector.

E. Fisher, a Central station fireman, has resigned.

Thomas Beasley, ex-city clerk, who has had both legs amputated because of gangrene, is getting along nicely, altho in his 82nd year.

R. Russell, who was reported as being one of the victims of the Webb-wood wreck, was in Montreal.

Alfred F. Hardy, who came all the way from Boston to buy a terrible automobile, was charged in police court by his wife this morning with vagrancy. He said his wife had sold the car to him. RAISING SIXTY THOUSAND

Unique Gathering of Toronto Baptists to Total Results.

A representative meeting of Toronto Baptist pastors and laymen will be held on Saturday night at Dovercourt Baptist Church to report on the progress of the laymen's movement in their respective congregations. The meeting was called by H. Bryans, the city chairman. The year's objective in money has been \$60,000. On Saturday night the representatives of each church will chalk his collection on the blackboard, and the column be figured up. Over \$60,000 will be expected to be reported.

Secretary W. T. Stockhouse, Baptist laymen's secretary, said to "The World" yesterday that the laymen's movement was going forward by leaps and bounds in the Baptist churches of the Dominion. The aggregate for all Canada previous to the laymen's movement was but \$55,000, contrasted with nearly \$100,000 last year. The ultimate objective for Canadian Baptists was \$62,000 a year. So far only a fourth of the Baptist churches have been brought into touch with the movement and less than a twelfth have been organized along the new lines. When this is accomplished the ultimate objective will be within measurable distance.

KENORA POWER PLANT

Argument in Appeal Against Expropriation Values.

Argument was held yesterday before the arbitration board in connection with the expropriation of land on both sides of the Winnipeg River for power purposes by the first parcel of Kenora, W. Rowell, K.C., who is appearing for the town, will resume argument this morning at 10.30.

The town of Kenora, which is now the second, the companies have appealed from the expropriation proceeding and claim the land should be valued according to its value for power purposes. The Keewatin Co. want \$400,000 and the Hudson Bay \$1,600,000. The fight has been in the courts for three years and since last September before the arbitration board.

BOULEVARD SYSTEM

Park Commissioner Has Plan to Circle the City.

After studying conditions in other cities, Park Commissioner Wilson has a suggestion in a report made public yesterday to establish a system of boulevards in Toronto. The system will include six boulevards, which will completely encircle the city, and is as follows:

Humber Bay Boulevard, along the water front from Bathurst-street to the mouth of the Humber River.

Humber River Boulevard, following the course of the valley of the Humber from the bay to the northerly limit of the Lambton Golf Grounds, thence easterly to Weston-road.

Northern Boulevard, easterly from the Weston-road across the height of land to Baldwin's Creek, thence following the valley of the creek to Polar Plains-road, Ramsden Park and Yonge-street.

North Rosedale Boulevard, branching off from the Northern Boulevard at St. Clair-avenue and running easterly along this avenue to the ravine, thence grading down to the ravine, thence following the ravine to the intersection of the Don Valley Boulevard, following the course of the Don against the stream to the foot of Woodbine-avenue, by which avenue a connection with the bay could be made.

Island Boulevard, following the southern shore of the lake, from Woodbine-avenue to the foot of Bathurst-street, with ferry connections crossing the eastern and western entrances to the harbor.

CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION

Will Be Held in Ottawa in the Month of June Next.

OTTAWA, Jan. 24.—The federal Conservative convention will be held in Ottawa on Wednesday, June 15 next. The result is taken in unprejudiced quarters as a distinct victory for Mr. Borden, for it had been rumored that certain influences which were at work for the selection of Winnipeg were hostile to his leadership.

H. P. Perley of Ottawa was elected chairman of committee, and A. E. Blount was appointed permanent secretary. An executive committee was appointed to arrange for election of delegates to convention from every constituency in the Dominion and to carry out all details incident to the convention.

It was decided to ask a committee of twelve citizens of Ottawa to take charge of local arrangements.
