## M. H. D. WARNS TEACHER TO BE CAREFUL OF CHILD

Shouldn't Be Abrupt or Threatening, for Shock May Injure Young Brain.

Dr. Sheard yesterday afternoon in the Guild Hall held the close attention of several hundred school teachers while he dwelt, from various points of view, upon the extreme importance of treating children with the greatest care and gentleness owing to the super-sensitiveness of that most complex organ, the brain, whence emanate all the directing forces of the body. He illustrated his lecture by means of a blackboard and chalk.

Chorea, or St. Vitus' dance, was often produced, he said, through a sudden mental shock or fright, causing a disturbing impression on the child's brain, which it sometimes had to begin with, or thru limitation; and in consequence of the renewal of these disturbing impressions the injury to the brain grew until serious results were reached. Teachers, parents, etc., did much mischief to children of nervous or sanguine temperaments through a manner of speech—threatening or abrupt—or attitude, by which their brains were in this manner affected. Stammering was nothing more than a charge of the vocal organs.

In regard to intemperance, he stated that no one familiar with its terrible consequences could advocate any other policy than temperance, altho, he added, that an immense amount of "rot" and rubbish was contained in works published on this subject and in the schools.

## Hamilton Happenings

### HAMILTON IN THE GRIP OF A GANG OF THIEVES

Ald. A. J. Wright Makes Complaint That Police Are Inactive—General News of the City.

HAMILTON, (Nov. 11.—Special.)—At the meeting of the city council this evening Ald. A. J. Wright complained that the city was in the grip of thieves and hold-up men and he said there appeared a lack of activity amongst the police.

His wife had been held up at 4 o'clock the afternoon. The papers were full of such occurrences, but half the reports were not published. If things continued as at present it would be necessary for a man to carry a gun in his hip-pocket. The police were a very expensive affair, but the public got poor returns. He asked the mayor as a police commissioner to see if the police could not be stirred up to greater activity.

His worship said the chief had been pleading for men, which the city had refused to give him. He thought, considering that there were but 50 officers, the police were doing fairly well.

Waterworks Discussion. The aldermen had a long discussion on the proposed waterworks bylaw, but it was finally referred to the committee again. Ald. Clark was given authority to hold an investigation into the charges made by ex-Capt. Bongard of the aldermen, the several of the aldermen said they would stand for no expense in connection with the matter.

Bylaws appointing A. T. Neil assistant tax collector, to raise \$50,000 for new waterworks pumps, and to regulate street traffic were passed. The by-law regulating the sale of oil was referred back.

It was arranged that the whole council was to meet informally to consider the question of either submitting a good roads bylaw for \$200,000 or the introduction of local improvement. On a close vote authority was granted to introduce a bylaw, to be drawn up later by the collector, to give Lake Bailey the right to have a switch on East Main-street. W. A. H. Duff wrote threatening a lawsuit if the council dared to enforce an agreement governing the connection to sewers granted the residents of Barton, but the agreement was adopted. A petition will be sent to the postmaster-general asking him to see that the vestibule of the postoffice is kept open on holidays, to allow box-holders access to the building.

The Martin Malone appeal against the assessment of the estate of the late Edward Martin, K.C., was postponed until Saturday morning by the court of revision this afternoon, because proper notice had not been served on the trustees of the estate. Mr. Malone announced his intention of subpoenaing the trustees to make them give a declaration of the late Martin's income.

Canadian Club. The Canadian Club had a discussion this evening on the proposal to return to the old water system. The speakers were: William Barrett, F. E. McPherson, F. A. Walker, James Kerr, William Barry, A. J. Wilkes, Walter Parke, R. B. McCullough, Allan Macdonald, M.L.A., R. A. Robertson and John Hoodless. Every speaker was opposed to the return to the water system. A minority spoke in favor of a smaller number of aldermen, a board of control, or commissioners. Many speakers dwelt on the expense of the system, and the danger to the city of a smaller number of aldermen, a board of control, or commissioners. The matter was referred to the executive to take whatever action it thought necessary. Mr. Hoodless expressed the opinion that there was no danger in Hamilton and that the aldermen were all honest.

Wellington Livingstone, 23 Wilson-street, was run down by a radial car at 10.50 to-night at the corner of Wilson and Mary-streets, and probably fatally injured. He was taken to the city hospital unconscious and with blood flowing from his ears.

It was reported the other day that the householders and storekeepers in Hamilton were beginning to find out that the Cataract Power Co.'s new electric lighting rates were pretty much like a gold brick. That view now seems more evident than ever, because the Hamilton Gas Light Co. announced in the Hamilton papers that they will guarantee furnish steady, more brilliant and reliable light than the Electric Light Co. at their new rates, at one-half the price for domestic purposes and one-half less for stores and commercial lighting. It is well known that this can be done, because the efficiency of artificial gas lighting has been increased more than 700 per cent. by the modern incandescent gas lamps.

## News Notes.

H. J. Corsar, 137 North Sherman-avenue, was charged in police court this morning with striking George Taylor with an iron bar. The complainant was not able to appear, and the case was enlarged.

F. E. Boniface, 231 West Charlton-avenue, says his house was broken into last night by thieves who took \$18 and \$32 worth of jewelry.

The Ministerial Association decided this morning to ask the board of education to start night classes in English for foreigners. There are said to be about 500 foreigners in the city.

The Hamilton, Steel and Iron Company has doubled its capacity for casting iron by installing a new furnace with a capacity of 300 tons a day.

Austin Cary in the county court this morning got judgment of \$5 against the Hamilton Painless Dental Parlor for negligence and fraud.

Martin Malone has commenced an action against H. H. Bicknell of the law firm of McClelland and Bicknell on behalf of William Wythe, who claims that he lost \$60 through the negligence of the lawyer in a land deal.

Word has been received of the death of Andrew Moore, a former Hamiltonian, at War Eagle, West Virginia.

The New Sovereign Bank. W. Wallace Bruce, the manager of Sovereign Bank, courteously showed our representative over the new premises located at 9 Market-square. The place is 50x150 feet, and the fittings are in weathered oak. The various departments are divided into sections to give depositors of both branches a more satisfactory facility. The offices on Saturday being open in the evenings from 7 to 10.

## CANADIAN PUBLIC PAYS.

Editor World: Are you aware that the postmaster-general of Canada, acting in his official capacity, went to Washington on or about May 4 of this year and made an arrangement with the American government there—whereby the Canadian public, either individually or collectively, as families, businesses, local townships and civic organizations, all have to pay for the privilege of having their letters and telegrams sent to the United States? In fact, the whole public, in the full sense of the term, have to pay into the treasury at Washington sums of money that, in the aggregate, will run over one million dollars per year at least? In addressing the subject, I do so because I do not believe that you, as editor of a responsible daily paper, which tries to live up to its obligations as such, are aware of the retrograde and public generally are also not aware of it.

Again, let me emphasize: Because of an arrangement entered into by the postmaster-general of Canada with the Washington government, Canada is being drained of sums of money which, in the aggregate, over one million dollars per year, for which Canadians get nothing in return.
