How to Save Wheat, Beef and Bacon for the Men at the Front. Issued from the Office of the Food Controller for Canada.

MENU FOR FRIDAY

Breakfast: Cornmeal Porridge, Milk, Sugar, Toast, Pear Jam, Tea or Coffee.

Lunch: Scalloped Tomatoes, Bran Gems, Butter, Apple Sauce, Tea.

Dinner: Broiled Flounder, Potatoes, Parsnips, Steamed Ginger Pudding, Vanilla Sauce.

The recipes for Bran Gems and Broiled Flounder, mentioned above, are as follows:

Bran Gems—

1½ cups flour

1 cup sour milk

1 cup molasses

1 teaspoon salt

1½ cups soda and butter

Mix and sift dry ingredients, add milk to molasses, and combine mixture; then add butter.

Ginger Pudding—

1½ cups sugar

1 egg

2½ cups flour

¾ teaspoon baking powder

1½ cups milk

1½ cups ginger

1 cup milk

Turn into a buttered mold. Cover and steam two hours. (Recipes by domestic science experts of the food controller's office.)

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OUTLOOK BETTER FOR LIBERTY LOAN

Big Rush of Subscribers Seems to Assure the Five Billion Total.

Washington, Oct. 24.—A torrent of Liberty Day subscriptions has swept the Liberty Loan nearer its goal by hundreds of millions of dollars.

How the total has been carried by this, the banner day's activities, no one could tell tonight. Indications, however, pointed to a total of \$2,000,000,000.

At noon yesterday, the total had reached or passed the \$2,000,000,000 minimum, but still lacked approximately \$2,000,000,000 of the maximum hoped for.

"It was believed unlikely," says the department's statement, "that anything like the correct estimate of the total day's business could be given before tomorrow." Fairly complete returns on transactions up to early afternoon, indicated totals of \$2,715,000,000 and these figures led to the hope that the \$3,000,000,000 minimum had been reached before the close of the day. If this three billion mark is reached, the loan may be termed a success.

Every report received tonight at the treasury bore the same burden, tremendous returns on the day's business. President Wilson personally subscribed to \$15,000 of the loan.

THRIFT COMMITTEE ANNUAL MEETING

Women Have Done Much for National Life in Educational Way.

TOO MUCH CANDY USED

Retiring President Deplores Use of Sweets During Time of War.

The annual meeting of the thrift and resources committee was held yesterday afternoon in the city hall, Miss C. Laing in the chair.

Miss Church, secretary, read the report of the various activities of the year, which she summarized as having been of great interest to the national life of the country and of great help to the spread of patriotism among women.

The report of the treasurer, Mrs. Thompson, was read by Mrs. C. Laing. She showed receipts of \$180.03 and expenses, \$176.35.

The report of the garden committee, read by the convener, Mrs. J. B. Tyrrell, told of gardens taken up by soldiers' wives to whom seed had been given; of lectures delivered in the Technical school with the idea of educating the public on the subject of production; of 4000 gardens known to have resulted from the work of the city and demonstrations of thrift in food given in Earlscourt and at the National Exhibition. The work done by the organization thru its convener, Mrs. J. B. Tyrrell, in the matter of raising interest in war bonds and selling war certificates, was read, Mrs. Warren stating that the work had been given to the public schools and a trophy promised to the room that could show the largest results. The silver cup to be awarded was shown.

It was also reported that hundreds of thousands of circulars regarding war-saving, which had been distributed, and that the government at the present time was preparing for a very large war loan campaign.

Too Much Candy Used. Mrs. H. H. Loosmore, the retiring president, whose good work during the year was appreciated by her entire committee, gave an inspiring address in which she pointed out that because a food controller had been appointed it by no means implied that the entire work of food conservation had been accomplished. The work needed had to be done to a great extent by making public opinion, Mrs. Loosmore stated, more church societies and educational institutions, which offer to their guests the most delicately local dishes at the time when sugar is of such value, and declared it was absolutely unenlightened on the part of caterers not to display war-time bread in the finest of the Saturday afternoon rush, when it was almost impossible to get the candy stores without being pushed by girls and young men with \$2 boxes of candies under their arms.
