While the animals remained at the stables the owners had to provide the food for their upkeep and look after their needs, while the Exhibition provided bedding straw. As approximately 20v tons of this, costing about \$18.75 a ton, was used, it cost the Exhibition about \$3.750 to all the live stock.

Exhibitors of live stock were practically all from either Ontario or Quebec, the western Canada and American breeders failing, as in former years, to compete. It is the opinion of live stock officials at the Exhibition that American breeders would send their cattle and horses to the big fair if if were not for registration, and reciprocity was in force Letween the two countries.
