THE RUSSIAN VICTORY

Petrograd, July 4.—In the fighting of Sunday and Monday 80,000 officers, 18,000 men, twenty-nine guns and thirty-three machine guns were captured by the Russians.

TWENTY-THREE STATES ARE "BONE DRY" NOW

Twenty-three American states became dry at midnight on Saturday night, the effective hour of the Reed amendment, prohibiting shipment of liquor into any territory where its manufacture or sale is prohibited. Eleven other states are partially affected by the legislation, which has been hailed by temperance advocates as the greatest single step toward abolition of the liquor traffic yet taken in the nation's history. The law bars from prohibition areas, whether states or smaller corporations, will mail matter containing advertisements or solicitations for orders for intoxicants, a provision designed to aid in enforcing the anti-shipment feature by suppressing the activities of mail order houses in dry territory.

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FEWER VESSELS SUNK THAN IN SEVERAL WEEKS

London, July 4.—Field Marshall Von Hindenburg's prediction on his return from Austrian headquarters that Germany's enemies would be forced to make peace in the not too distant future if the Germans held their ground until the submarine had done its work will receive a prompt and convincing reply in the weekly figures of sinkings of vessels when they are issued tomorrow.

The total will be the smallest in several weeks.

The conclusion has been reached that it is impossible for the submarines to maintain a large number of sinkings which will have an appreciable effect on the overseas communications of the allies.

EMPIRE PRESS UNION. WANT OVERSEAS PAPERS TO COME IN BULK. London, July 3.—(Montreal Gazette Cable)—At the council meeting of the Empire Press Union today a protest was made against the recent restrictions against the importation of overseas newspapers in bulk, particularly for distribution to overseas troops, and to the hospitals. SHIPBUILDING. A conference between the mayor, the city commissioners and city solicitor and W. A. Ewing, K.C., solicitor for D. A. The discussion was along the same lines as that in the common council yesterday, the city's chief objection being with regard to the length of time for which exemption is asked but, at the close of the conference it was said that negotiations seemed to be progressing towards an agreement.

Supplies for Sweden. Copenhagen, July 4.—A despatch from Malmo says that thirty steamers, thanks to England's generosity, are now on the way to Sweden with corn and raw materials. They are keeping within the German safety zone. Recently Germany offered to permit vessels to leave certain ports on July 1 provided they adhered to certain conditions.

From ten to twenty Danish steamers are anxious to utilize the German safe conduct, but it is not known how many will be able to sail.
