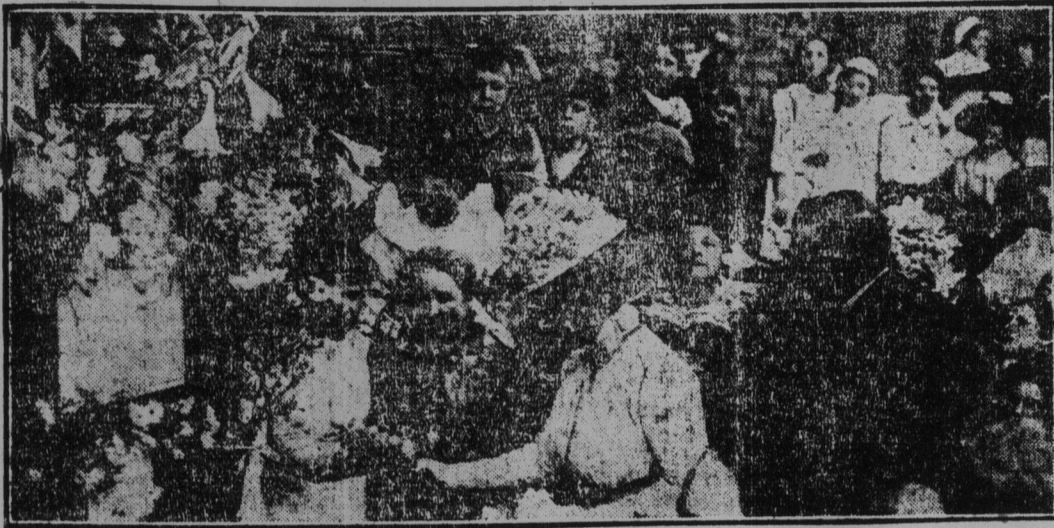


ROYAL TRIBUTE TO THE BRAVE QUEEN'S DECORATE ROLLS OF HONOR

EFFECTIVE CLOSING OF ANNIVERSARY OF FAIRVILLE CHURCH

The anniversary and rally week in celebration of the thirty-fifth anniversary of the Fairville Baptist church closed yesterday with the observation of rally day in the Sunday school. At the school the services of the King of Kings. During the first part of the programme the local school under the leadership of the superintendent, Harvey Arbo, Mr. Arbo's address was upon "What Our School Seeks to do for Your Children." This was especially directed to the many parents who were present and proved very practical and helpful.

The world Sunday school army was then presented upon the platform by a group of thirty scholars, representing the five continents of the world and the number of Sunday schools, teachers and scholars in each. With this army before the audience, Rev. P. R. Hayward then conducted a recruiting rally, cards similar to the following form had been distributed to the audience and each person present was given an opportunity to line up with the Christian army in any one or more of several ways. A "backslider" in the Christian army was one who believed in the church, but hung aloof from active support. Similar cards were what we commonly call the "backslider." The "home guard" was the home department; the "training course" was the training course for teachers; the "home war fund" was the current expenses of the church and the "Allied funds" was the missionary funds.

A large number of these cards were signed. Similar cards will be used by the pastor in his next round of pastoral calls and it is hoped that many more will have the opportunity of enlisting later. The card reads: THE RECRUITING RALLY FOR THE ARMY OF THE KING OF KINGS Fairville Baptist Battalion

1. I will be a sinner no longer, but an out-and-out Christian.

2. I will stop being a deserter.

3. I will join the adult corps.

4. I will join the home guard.

5. I will take the officers' training course.

6. I will read the soldiers' handbook daily.

7. I will confer daily with my leader.

8. I will report twice each month at the prayer meeting.

9. I will report at least at five Sunday services each month.

10. I will give each week to the home war fund, and to the Allied funds.
