NEW APPOINTMENT FOR COL. McLEAN

Special Recruiting Officer For
Maritime Provinces — Major
McLean Wins D. S. O. — Soli-
citor General Going to Front

Col. H. H. McLean, M. P., has been appointed special recruiting officer for the maritime provinces. His son, Major C. Weldon McLean, O. C. "A" Battery, R. H. Artillery in France, has been decorated with the D. S. O. by the king for special skill in carrying out orders in a recent artillery drive.

George A. Peters, Vancouver, B. C., 28th Battalion, is reported wounded while Wm. A. Davis, Lakeside, Queens Co., and Fidele Gullant, P. E. I., are reported returned to duty after having been wounded.

Hon. Arthur Meighen, solicitor general of Canada, has volunteered and will go to the front as quartermaster with the Grenadier Guards of Montreal.

A pleasant time was enjoyed last night by the members of the Siege Battery when they came from their quarters at Hartfield Island to West St. John, and in the drill hall there, a reception was tendered them by citizens of Charlottetown.

Soloists were given by Misses Baskin, Fenton and Ring, besides other numbers by the soldiers. Refreshments were served with a committee composed of Mrs. Martinson, Mrs. A. J. Mulcahey and Mrs. F. A. Lilley directing. It was a most successful gathering.

Wm. McMann, a city teamster, was honored yesterday by associates in the department of public works in the presentation of a wrist watch, presented by Commissioner Potts in their behalf, with best wishes.

Brig. General Rutherford is to retire at O. C. 8th M. D. with headquarters at Halifax, and is to be succeeded by Brig. General Benson, chief ordnance officer.

Pte. George Robertson, 28th Battalion, wounded and now in hospital in Edinburgh, Scotland, has written to his home in Prince William, N. B., saying he was recovering after his injuries and expected to be back in France by Christmas.

Captain J. W. Worden, a former New Brunswick officer, whose home was in Baywater, is to be given command of a new battalion of infantry to be raised soon in British Columbia. Capt. Worden was in St. John a few weeks ago, on his way back from the front, where he had been severely wounded. He has resided in Vancouver for many years.
