NEW BRUNSWICK IN BATTLE WITH THREE GUNMEN

Charles Folkins Gets Clip on
Head With Revolver
Butt

ATTACK IS MADE IN
CAMBRIDGE STORE

Cousin of Saint John Men
Saves Money For
Employers

Word has been received here that Charles Folkins, manager of the Atlantic & Pacific chain store at 113 Main street, Cambridge, Mass., had been held up in the store by gunmen and severely injured by the butt of a revolver brought down on his head when he resisted. Mr. Folkins is a brother of Heber Folkins, of Sussex, and a cousin of George W. Folkins, a Union street business man here, and of C. W. Folkins of West Saint John. He is 60 years of age, and is a native of the Millstream section of Kings County.

THREE HOLD-UP MEN
Three armed young men entered the store and ordering Manager Folkins and clerks and customers to throw up their hands, rifled the cash register of \$70. The customers were locked in the stock room, but Manager Folkins resisted one of the robbers and was able to toss \$200 under the counter before the bandit could get this money. In the struggle Mr. Folkins was struck with a revolver butt and his scalp torn open. While he lay unconscious his wallet with \$10 was taken. His condition, however, is not serious. One shot was fired during the hold-up, but it struck nobody. The robbers escaped in a motor car with only \$80. Manager Folkins was highly complimented by his superiors for his bravery and in saving \$200.

CHATHAM, May 28.—The annual state convention of the Knights of Columbus was held here yesterday. The business session of the convention was preceded by a solemn high mass in St. Michael's Cathedral. The celebrant was Rt. Rev. Monsignor J. W. O'Keefe, assisted by Rev. Fathers Hill and Keane.

His Lordship Bishop Chisholm, of Chatham, in an eloquent sermon, dealt principally on the high aims and ideals of the order and of the great work it had accomplished for the Catholic Church.

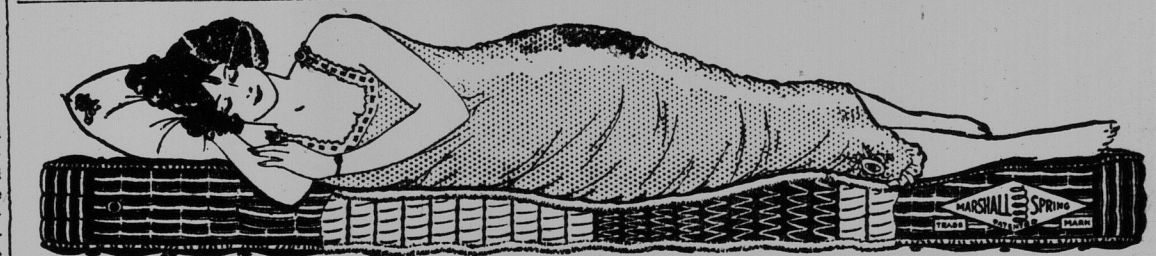
NEW STORE FOR McADAM

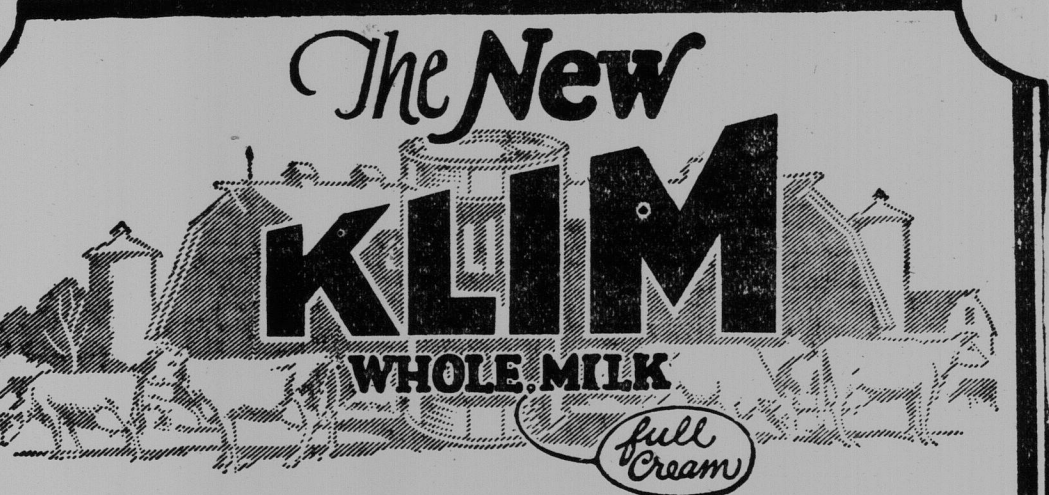
