## SNOW STORM DOES DAMAGE IN NORTH

North Bay, Ont., Oct. 3.—Reports trickling in from various parts of Temiskaming today indicate that considerable damage was done by Wednesday's snow storm. Heavy wet snow fell to a depth of six inches in several parts, including the Cobalt area. Many farmers who had not taken in their grain had it flattened by the snow which, however, disappeared within twenty-four hours. The great majority of Temiskaming telephone lines are out of commission, having broken under the strain of the snow clinging to them. In Milberta section, several roads were blocked by trees which were broken down by the weight of the snow.
