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Famous Pitcher to Serve on Stadium Commission Seeking to Raise \$500,000.
Lewisburg, Pa., Jan. 24.—"Count me in," wrote Christy Mathewson of baseball fame on the invitation sent to him by the Bucknell University Stadium Commission asking him to become an associate member of the commission in its effort to raise \$500,000 for a stadium and new athletic plant for Bucknell. John D. Shirely of Pittsburgh, the stadium commissioner, has just received Mathewson's answer, and from now on "Big Sis," known as one of the greatest of pitchers in the national game, will take an active part in the raising of the half million dollars which is the goal of his alma mater in the broadening of its athletic activities. Mathewson was graduated from Bucknell in 1902 and ever since has taken a keen interest in the welfare of the Orange and Blue.

The playing field of the new athletic plant, according to the schedule now planned by the commission, will be available for the opening game of the 1923 football season against the University of Pittsburgh. Around the field which will be of the latest French-drained model, will be built in all probability, temporary stands for the gridiron contests and while the stadium itself is expected to be ready for use at the start of the outdoor season next year.

Gavin Hadden of New York has informed the stadium executive committee that the proposed structure will give Bucknell the most complete playing field and seating arrangements in Pennsylvania outside of Franklin Field. It was Mr. Hadden who designed and built the new Franklin Field for the University of Pennsylvania.

In addition to Commissioner Shirely, the drive headquarters recently opened in Pittsburgh are in charge of Bob Waddell, football captain in 1919 for the Orange and Blue, and assistant coach the following year. The drive will begin in earnest at once.



Twelve Millionaires will Act as Directors of "The Creek" at Glen Cove, L. I.

New York, Jan. 24.—Twelve founding members of "The Creek," the recently projected "Million Dollar Golf Club," are named as the first directors of the exclusive organization, a certificate of incorporation for which has just been filed. It was announced by E. C. Route of 180 West Sixty-sixth street. The names and places of residence of the twelve millionaire directors of what is undoubtedly the richest golf club in the world are given as follows in the announcement: Vincent Astor, Rhinebeck, N. Y.; Frank Longfellow Crocker, Scarsdale, N. Y.; Marshall Field, Huntington, L. I.; Harvey D. Gibson, New York City; Edward S. Harkness, New York City; Richard Howe, Jericho, N. Y.; Charles B. MacDonald, Southampton, L. I.; Clarence H. Mackay, Roslyn, N. Y.; John P. Morgan, Glen Cove, L. I.; Herbert L. Pratt, Glen Cove, L. I.; John D. Ryan, Bufile, Mont., and Harry Payne Whitney, Westbury Hills, N. Y. The twelve directors will hold office until the first annual meeting, which will take place on the third Wednesday in June. The certificate sets forth that the particular objects for which the corporation is formed are to provide and maintain a golf course, tennis courts, bathing beach and other facilities for out-of-door recreation and sport and to operate and conduct a social club for the benefit of its members.
