At a meeting of the St. John Teachers' Association on Friday evening in the Natural History Society rooms, A. C. Gorham, director of elementary education for the province, gave an interesting and educational talk on the curriculum of our public schools, dealing principaly with the nature study and agricultural courses as outlined for this province.

agricultural courses as outlined for this province.

In the course of discussion, which was for the most part of a constructive nature, the question of the rural problem was brought up and the cause of the large influx of people from the farms to the city. There was much talk about the high cost of living as one of the factors affecting it. It was concluded that in a democratic country such as this was supposed to be there was not equality of educational opportunity; that city ideals dominated all educational aims and practices. The tendency had been to draw the youth and whole families from the farms. More students got into the high schools yet with this only a very small proportion graduated from high schools and about one-half of one per cent graduated for the university.
