## MRS. CHILDS, SHOT AT REXTON, DEAD

Louis Hubert's Canon Reported Critical - Search For Robert Childs

Moncton, May 15—A posse, under Sheriff Boudreau, has been searching the woods near Rexton, N. B., for Robert Childs, alias Robert McIntosh, who shot his nephew's wife, Mrs. John Childs, her son Harold, aged sixteen, and a neighbor and then set fire to a barn. Mrs. Childs died last night, and Louis Herbert, a neighbor, is in a critical condition.

Robert Childs came to Moncton from Buctouche on Wednesday, returning last night. Early this morning he went out to the old family homestead on the St. Nicholas river, a beautiful spot about one and a half miles from Rexton. His nephew, John Childs, lives at the homestead. It is said that Robert contended that he had a claim on the property and had a grudge against his brother's family. Whether this is true or not is yet unknown. Childs, it is believed, entered it and, it is alleged, shot Mrs. Childs in the habit of going to work at 6 o'clock, but last night there was some accident to the machinery and he went an hour earlier than usual this morning to make repairs.

Judging from the hour at which Robert Childs went out to the Childs homestead it was the intention of Robert to meet his nephew. But they did not meet, possibly owing to the fact that the nephew went to his work earlier than usual. According to a story received here this afternoon when Robert Childs reached the house he insisted that a farm employee, Robert Harding, should set fire to the building. When the hired man refused to do this, Robert Childs went into the house and made the same demand of Mrs. Childs. They unfortunately did not take him seriously and Harold Childs and Robert Harding went to the barn with some grain. When they left the barn they discovered that the barn had been set on fire. They rushed to the barn, but in the meantime Robert Childs had reached the house, entered it and, it is alleged, shot Mrs. John Childs and set fire to the house. Two neighbors, Louis Herbert and his son, noticing the fire rushed over to give assistance. Six head of cattle and one horse were burned, but another horse was taken out by Louis Herbert, but Childs shot the horse after it was taken out.

His description is given as a man smoothly shaven, walks erect, has grey hair and would weigh about 180 pounds. The property on which the shooting took place is the Childs' homestead, owned by John Childs and his family. Robert, the uncle, has always claimed that he is entitled to the property or a portion of it, but acquaintances, however, say that this belief was but imagination only, and that he has always been considered of unsound mind. Three years ago it is alleged, he made threats to burn out the family of his nephew, John and also to shoot them. He visited the place three summers ago and stayed around for some time. During the day he would go away in a boat and return at nights to the vicinity of the property.
