LIKELY TO HAVE MARKED EFFECT

Assassination of Heir to Austrian Throne and His Wife

BURDEN NOW ON EMPEROR

Late Archduke a Very Powerful Man and He Will be Missed by Aged Ruler—Some Look For More Peaceful Times

Sarajevo, Bosnia, June 28.—Archduke Francis Ferdinand, heir to the Austria-Hungarian throne, and his wife, the Princess of Hohenberg, his morganatic wife, were shot dead in the main street of the Bosnian capital by a student today while they were making an apparently triumphant progress through the city on their annual visit to the annexed provinces of Bosnia and Herzegovina.

MORE IN HONOR CLASS

Gratifying Increase There is Feature—Miss Stevens Leads Class With More Than 90 Per Cent—The Closing Programme

ANOTHER BURIED CITY HAS BEEN DISCOVERED

Egyptologist Finds One as Well Preserved as Pompeii

London, June 28.—Recent exploration in the Nile Valley has resulted in the discovery of a buried Egyptian city as well preserved as Pompeii, according to the Rev. Professor A. H. Sayce, a famous Egyptologist, in an address at the Royal Society. The discovery was made by Professor Gardang, investigating at Merut, where the Nile river bed is surrounded by a royal city containing two palaces, public baths, gymnasiums, streets and private dwellings.
