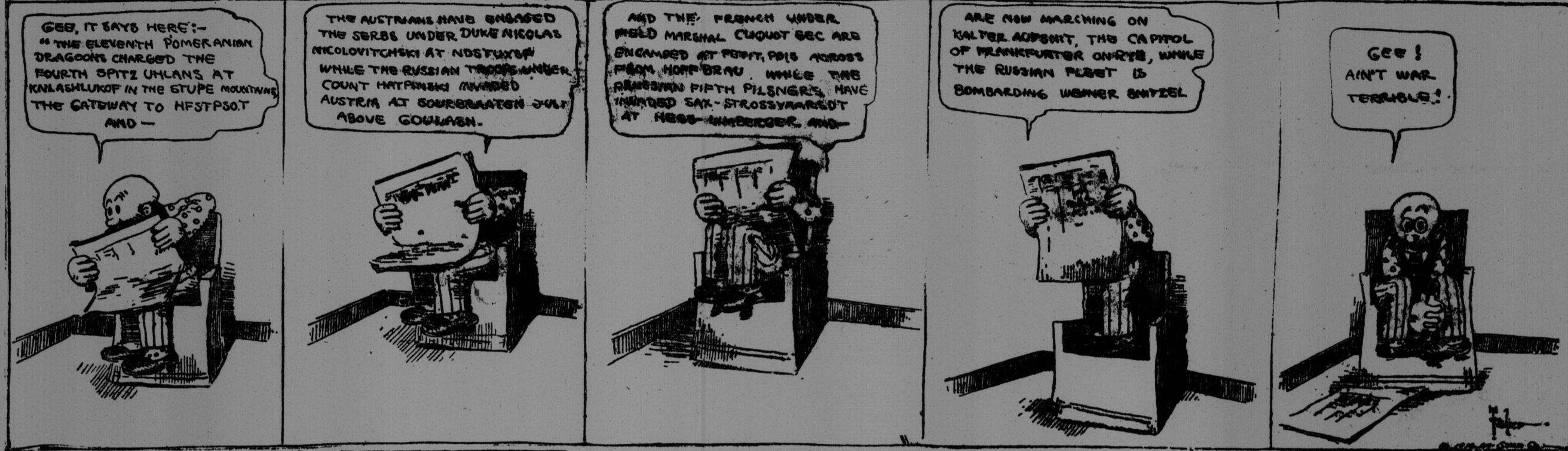

### BELGIANS FLOCK TO MONTREAL FOR SERVICE

Montreal, Aug. 11.—"Every train is bringing to Montreal Belgian reservists ready and anxious to return home for active service against Germany," said Clarence I. de Sola, the Belgian Consul. "More than four thousand have already reported, and they are coming in all the time. The office has been as you see it now all day."

At the time a party of between fifty and sixty Flemish reservists were concluding arrangements for their passage home. They were a fine body of men, every one of whom had seen service. The news of Belgian victories caused great excitement and was followed by demonstrations around the consulate. Mr. de Sola found himself constantly surrounded on the streets by crowds wishing to offer their congratulations upon the victories achieved by Belgian arms.

The recruits now coming in, he said, are largely from the farmers in the west, which they are leaving without question in spite of the approaching harvest. Many are paying their own passage home.

**May Change Boxing Map**  
The war in Europe may not only change the map of the continent, but it may bring about changes in the world's boxing situation. Four boxing champions may be lost to the roped arena before peace is restored. Jack Johnson, the heavyweight champion of the world; Georges Carpentier, who is recognized as the white heavyweight champion; "Bombardeer" Wells, the oft-defeated, but still heavyweight champion of Great Britain; and Charles Ledoux, the bantam title holder of Europe, are all subject to war call.

Jack Johnson, a native of the United States, renounced his allegiance to that country, and became a citizen of France. President Poincare has called every man in France under forty-five years of age to the colors. Johnson is thirty-six years of age and will have to fight whether or not.

Carpentier and Ledoux have already answered the call and are already awaiting the word to advance. "Bombardeer" Wells, who saw service in India, is a reservist in the British army and will be called upon when Tommy Atkinson boards the troopship.
