#### MORTALITY AMONG WOUNDED SO FAR IN THIS WAR LOW

London, Oct. 20.—Sir William Osler,  
regius professor of medicine at Oxford,  
and since the beginning of the war in  
al work in England says—  
"I think this war will set a new re-  
cord for low mortality among the wounded  
of any war. Formerly, with the best first aid  
and hospital work, a mortality record of  
5 or 6 per cent. of those who reached the  
base hospitals was considered cred-  
itable. Up to date there has been but  
one fatality out of more than 700  
wounded who have reached the base  
hospital at Oxford. This death was  
caused by a bullet in the head."

"The result is partly due to the self-  
sterilization of the modern high veloc-  
ity bullet, and partly to efficient field  
first aid. I have yet to see a wound in-  
flicted by either a dum dum or an ex-  
posed bullet."

"If the experience of the past counts  
for anything, the expeditionary force on  
the continent has more to fear from the  
bacteria of typhoid fever than from bul-  
lets or bayonets."

"I have never seen a group of recruits  
marching to a depot without mentally  
asking what percentage will be left leg-  
itimate and honorable deaths from wound-  
ing and what percentage will perish miser-  
ably from the neglect of ordinary san-  
itary precautions."

"All fighting forces should take ad-  
vantage of the knowledge that the hu-  
man body can be protected from typhoid  
fever by vaccination. The success of this  
measure in the armies of the United  
States and France is proving it. I do  
not fear that typhoid fever will break  
out in the camps in England. There  
is little risk of the disease in Eng-  
land, but this is not so in the large areas  
of the continental theatre of war."

"And then, with the coming of win-  
ter, the prevention of pneumonia will be  
a problem. It cannot be prevented, like  
typhoid, by vaccination. The body is  
all the water drunk. Many people  
carry pneumonia germs with them  
which are the cause of the disease. The  
soldier is in good condition, but which  
make their way to the lungs when the  
resting powers of the body are lowered  
by exposure incident upon long marches  
and hard fighting in cold and rain."

Seventy thousand prisoners

London, Oct. 23. 3.20 a. m.—An Am-  
sterdam despatch to the Central News  
quotes a telegram from the Burgomaster  
of Wendayne, Belgium, as follows:  
"Victory is with the Allies. Seventy  
thousand men have been taken prisoners  
between Chalons and Longwy. Three  
guns and thirty-one flags have been cap-  
tured."
