STORMY SESSION OF COUNTY COUNCIL

Straight Voting, The County Against City THERE WERE LIVELY TILTS

Trouble Over Bills for Legislation - Legislation to Cut Down Police Court Fines for Drunkenness to \$2—The Road Act That Does Not Work

A rather stormy session of the Municipal Council was held this morning and although they were in session for over three hours the amount of business transacted did not correspond to the length of time consumed in getting it through.

The session was marked by some very lively tilts between members of the council and, on one occasion between a councillor and the county secretary.

An unusual feature was the even division of the city and county members on several votes, and this continued until the city members threatened to withdraw.
