DEAD BABY IN TRUNK IN CELLAR

Evidence Points to Infanticide in Horsefield Street House—Authorities Have Young Girl Under Surveillance Pending Result of Post Mortem

The finding of the lifeless body of a male infant last evening in the cellar of a house occupied by a prominent citizen in 19 Horsefield street, is surrounded by peculiar circumstances and is believed to have brought to light a case of infanticide. The discovery was made by the head of the house, who was horrified at what he saw. He had the little body removed with the consent of Coroner Berryman, who was summoned, and was soon on hand in company with Detective Killen. The little child was placed in the morgue and it is probable that a post-mortem examination will this afternoon be made to determine what is expected to be shown that the baby was born alive.

The mother of the child is at present in the General Public Hospital, and has been for about a month. She was sent there after having declined medical treatment at the hands of a physician whose services were secured by her employer, and also because it was seen that she was very ill. She was employed as a servant and had been in the family only about three weeks when she took ill. She refused all proffers of medical assistance, though being kindly treated by her employer and his wife. She told them she came here from Fredericton, and was a native of Scotland, having been in Canada but five months, and her story was looked upon as being true.

About a month ago her employer and his wife went to Montreal and it is believed that it was then that the birth of the little one occurred. Last evening the householder referred to had occasion to go down to the cellar and open an old trunk which had long been out of use. On lifting the cover there was revealed the body of the child, wrapped in a few old clothes. It was well preserved, as the cellar was cold, in spite of the fact that the little body had been there for a month at least.

RED STAR LINERS TO THIS PORT

It Means Much Immigration Business and Some See in it The Passing of American Ports, in Favor of Canadian, in Continental Immigration

The recently reported transfer of big liners from the New York to the Canadian route means much to St. John as the winter ports of the Dominion are to get their share of the extra business resulting from this move.

During the present season two Red Star liners, the Barcelona and Sanland, will be here. The former is now on her way from Rotterdam with 1000 passengers. She is a steamer of 3,200 tons. The Sanland, which will follow her, is a big steamer of about 10,000 tons and she will bring a large passenger list. Next year there will be more of the line, and as these craft are taken from the New York to the Canadian route, they will make Montreal their summer and St. John their winter terminus. While on this route they will fly the flag of the Canada line. Messrs. Wm. Thomson & Co. are the agents of the line here.

The Sanland and Gothland, which will in future sail under the flag of the Canada line, and will be an acquisition to the immigrant traffic, which Canada is at the present time doing with the Continent of Europe, there was also another standing firm which the matter might be viewed. This was, he said, from the point of the American authorities, and the fact that these two ships, which had been doing such good work in the immigration trade for many years, had been found by their owners to be superfluous on the New York run and had therefore been transferred to the Canadian route, might give valuable food for reflection among some of the egoists on the other side of the line.

Perhaps, he said, this might at last wake them up to the fact that the Canadian route, which they have for so many years despised, is actually in process of becoming the chief factor in the immigrant trade of the whole of the North American continent.
