GIANTS WILL TAKE A BIG SQUAD TO CAMP

Announce List of 18 Rockies in Addition to Other Recruits and Regulars.

New York, Dec. 1.—The Giants have revealed the names of some of the young men whom they are going to take South (or West) with them next spring. Of the partial list of thirteen announced yesterday, nine were pitchers, indicating that John J. McGraw considers the club department in greatest need of a little overhauling. Three of the hurlers in question are left-handers, which may or may not be an item of interest to Arthur Nehf.

The lone catcher is John Anderson, who was drafted from the Beaumont Club in Texas. Then follow these right-handed twirlers: Joe Dillard, Southwestern University, Texas; Chester Lucas, Portsmouth Club of the Virginia League; Fred Lucas, Nashville Club; Earl Webb, Memphis; Guy Morrison, Bloomington Club of the Three-Base League; and Mike Cregg, Little Rock of the Southern Association. The last named performed in the late season at the Polo Grounds and was better than a fair pitcher. Webb is the youngster who was bought from Memphis after he had made a bit of a sensation in the Southern Association.

In the left-handed division are Fred Johnson, from San Antonio; Olin Voigt, repurchased from San Antonio, and George Walberg of Portland, Ore. Johnson was also one of the performers at the Polo Grounds in late September. The two infielders are Frank Fuller, from San Antonio, who was once with the Yankees and was shipped to Newark, and Travis Johnson, Little Rock. Mahlon Higbee is the only outfielder on the list. Says Landis Discriminated.
Chicago, Dec. 1.—President Terney of the Western and Three Eye Leagues, in a written protest to Commissioner of the Chicago White Sox, which played an exhibition game with an independent club of Ottawa, Ill., in which "neighbourly players were used President Terney declared the Peoria club was forbidden to play Ottawa. PHILIPPINE RECORD SET IN CROP AREA PLANTED

Agriculture Made Great Stride in 1921, But Failed to Get Benefits.

Manila, Oct. 28.—(By Mail).—The high-water mark was reached in Philippine agriculture in the year 1921, in so far as the area planted to the six leading crops of the islands is concerned, according to the annual report of the Bureau of Agriculture. In that year, 8,188,967 acres were cultivated, compared with 8,192,355 acres in 1920.

Notwithstanding the increase in acreage, the year was one of general dissatisfaction from a financial standpoint, the report says.

"Because of the record prices prevailing during 1919 and 1920, the cultivation of cubic crops, especially rice and sugar, was greatly extended. The area planted to rice in 1921 was increased by 127 per cent, to sugar cane by 28.3 per cent, to coconuts by 6.3 per cent, and to corn by 1.2 per cent.

"In yield per acre 1921 also shows an increase of 1.2 per cent in rice and 3.4 per cent in sugar cane over that of 1920, but the value of all Philippine crops fell from \$846,886,000 in 1920 to \$201,623,000 in 1921, or about 40 per cent."
