Canada to Curb Liquor Running

Will Restrict Fraudulent Ship Transfers—Communication from Sir Auckland Geddes to U. S. Secretary of State Hughes.

Washington, Dec. 22.—The intent of the Canadian Government to limit the British Government in an effort to restrict the smuggling of liquor into the United States was communicated to Secretary Hughes recently in a formal note from Sir Auckland Geddes, the British Ambassador.

The British Government had already previously acquiesced the State Department with the steps taken to restrict shipments of liquor on vessels fraudulently transferred from America to British registry. These included instructions to British officials in Bermuda and other outlying bases to closely scrutinize operations there.

The note from Sir Auckland Geddes follows:
"Sir: In the note which I had the honor to address to you on Oct. 19 last I was able to notify you of the steps which were being taken by His Majesty's Government for the purpose of restricting the smuggling of liquor into the United States by means of the fraudulent transfer of American vessels to the British registry."

"I now have the pleasure to inform you that the Government of Canada have indicated their desire to co-operate in this matter. They have accordingly issued new instructions to Registrars of Shipping in Canada regarding cases where an application is made to them to register a vessel which has been purchased from a United States citizen. These instructions are to the effect that unless the application for registry is supported by a certificate under the seal of the United States Shipping Board authorizing such transfer to British registry, all particulars in regard to the case in question, must be forwarded to the competent department of the Canadian Government for instructions before any definite steps are taken for the transfer of the vessel in question."

This tender of Canadian co-operation was received with considerable gratification at the State Department.

Strasbourg, Nov. 22.—(By Mail) —The diploma of doctor honoris causa of Strasbourg University has been conferred upon Sir James Fraser, author of "The Golden Bough."

The degree was also conferred on Dr. Benes, Foreign Minister of Czechoslovakia, M. Carton de Wiart, former Prime Minister of Luxembourg, and the Italian historian, Signor Guglielmo Ferrero.
