

USE THOUSAND HYDRO PAYMENT TO REDUCE DEBT

Money for Transmission Line
in Rockwood Cuts Bank
Overdraft

WORK OF YEAR IN PARK IS TOLD OF

Promontory Cut Down—
Baboon Dies From Being
Fed Too Much.

At the annual meeting of the Horticultural Association this afternoon it was reported that the sum of \$1,000 had been received from the N. B. Power Commission for extension of the hydro transmission line through Rockwood Park and that this money had been used to reduce the association's overdraft at the Bank of Nova Scotia.

In addition to a report in detail of the finances, the members heard a resume of the work done during the year. The report of the managing committee, Hon. J. R. Armstrong, H. N. Skelton and A. B. Gandy, was as follows:

Electric Power Commission for settlement of the claim for damage caused to the association by the Power Commission extension of their transmission line through Rockwood Park, covering an area of 80 feet wide by 825 feet long, resulting in the association receiving the sum of \$1,000 which was received in March last. This amount, being other than ordinary revenue, was properly used to reduce the association's overdraft to the Bank of Nova Scotia. The commission desires that a receipt be given by the association under its corporate seal, authority therefor should be given at this meeting.

Promontory Cut Down.

The most work of the year was the cutting down of the promontory between the northern side of the driveway and Lily Lake to the west of the pavilion. This was lowered to the extent of six or eight feet. Covering a considerable area, and consisting almost entirely of hard rock, it was a very serious undertaking. The object which has been attained was the removal of the obstruction to the view of passersby of Lily Lake. The work is a permanent improvement of great value. The material removed was used for widening the roads nearby.

This, as well as the ordinary work at the park, was well carried out by John Henry, the head keeper, who as usual has given every satisfaction.

Mr. Tebo's Work.

The winter and summer attractions of the park have been well carried out as in the past by Joseph Tebo. The toboggan slide has been patronized very liberally and the skating facilities have been very largely used. Few realize what work by day, often extending far into the night, is necessary in maintaining an open air skating area. Frequently, after the snow is removed and the space carefully shoveled, snow again falls or a change in the temperature necessitates more labor. The small fee charged for the great convenience of checking walking boots is the only monetary remuneration. During the present winter there was but one day on which the ice on Lily Lake was fit for skating without work expended thereon.

In Summer Days.

In the summer season in fine weather the row boats were in constant use, and the bathing facilities were enjoyed by large and increasing numbers. The bathing ground was much improved by a considerable quantity of sand and fine gravel hauled there for that purpose. Mr. Tebo continues to give every satisfaction to the numerous callers at the pavilion and tea house. Visitors to the Zoo were probably greater in number than ever in previous years. It would be interesting to count were made of the many who visit this attraction on a fine Sunday afternoon in spring time.

MARBURN ARRIVES WITH 297 ABOARD

Ruthenians and Italians For
Western Canada Among Sand
Point Arrivals.

With 67 cabin and 280 third class passengers on board, in addition to 2,000 tons of merchandise and 308 bags of mail, the C. P. S. liner Marburn arrived here last evening from Antwerp, Southampton and Cherbourg.

The Marburn experienced rather heavy weather on the voyage but made the run in fairly good time. The passengers, most of whom were for western Canada points, left by C. P. R. special last evening.

C. P. R. Official Returns.

R. Waugh, of Winnipeg, who has been with the C. P. R. at Antwerp for the last four years, returned on the Marburn yesterday. Mr. Waugh will go to Chicago, where he will be attached to the C. P. R. office in that city. He was accompanied here by Mrs. Waugh, Miss E. Waugh and Master R. Waugh.

Among the third class were a number of Ruthenian and Italian who are going to Saskatchewan and Manitoba. The Marburn brought a shipment of high class Percherons, imported to Canada by W. J. McCallum, of Brompton. There were 10 of these horses on the Marburn and they stood the trip in great shape.

Letters addressed Treasurer, Rockwood Park, will be promptly acknowledged. It has been suggested that a "rose" would be a welcome addition to the native wild animals in the Zoo, but each mouse will consume as much food as a cow and requires expensive and extensive wire fencing for the construction of a suitable yard which at present the finances of the association will not warrant.

Baboon Fed Too Much.

The committee regret to have to report the loss of the baboon which for some years has been an object of much interest. 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\$36,000 SUBSIDY ON MARITIME GOAL TO DATE

Order-in-Council Passed to
Assist Transportation to
Central Canada

TOTAL AVAILABLE
FOR AID IS \$200,000

Board Has Approved Ship-
ments of 150,000 Tons
Up to Date.

OTTAWA, March 3.—Since the order-in-council was passed by the Dominion Government in September, 1924, providing for \$200,000 as federal assistance in the transportation of Canadian coal to Central Canada by payment to the railways, the Dominion Fuel Board has approved of the shipment of 150,000 tons of coal from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

The board, however, has no information as to the actual quantity of coal shipped. Based on the approval by the board of 150,000 tons, the government liability to the railways is \$36,000. The principal shipments from the Maritime Provinces were as follows: 10,000 tons to Hawkesbury, Ont.; 25,000 tons to Hull, Que.; 18,000 tons to Ottawa; 5,000 tons to Cornwall, Ont.; 22,000 tons to Lacombe, Que., and 18,000 tons to Sherbrooke, Que.
