Y. W. C. A. to Carry on Event During Championship Meet

Christmas Treat For Boosters—Time For Funds After New Year

The Y. W. C. A. will have charge of the arrangements for a grand carnival to be held in Saint John at the time of the world's skating championship meet next month. At a meeting of the board of directors held yesterday afternoon, with Mrs. E. C. Weyman, president, in the chair, plans were begun for assuming this responsibility and final arrangements made for the Christmas treat to be given Thursday to 170 "Boosters" who are members of the industrial clubs.

Friends of the "Y" have donated filled stockings for this treat. It is estimated that the average value of the stockings is \$1. Gratitude was expressed for these gifts. It was announced also that everything was in readiness for the Christmas concert to be given on Friday evening by the members of the gymnasium classes. Each of the classes will present some special stunt. The directors will give a prize for the one they judge the best.

REPORT OF MEETINGS.

It was reported that a strong committee of business men had gone

through the accounts of the association and had also made a valuation of all the "Y" property. On their advice, the launching of the drive for necessary funds was postponed until after the New Year.

The girls' work report, given by Mrs. T. H. Sommerville, told of the organization of a "Y-Jinx" Club among the High School girls to be literary and educational in its aims.

The Boosters' meetings had had almost perfect attendance. Mrs. E. C. Weyman had given the seniors a much appreciated address and demonstration and Miss Edna Hunt was planning educational work for them in which Mrs. Bertman Smith and Miss Blanche Whitehead were assisting. The "Y" Girls' Council had held two meetings and had had supper at the residence.

PHYSICAL CLASSES.

Miss Dorothy McArthur, physical instructor, reported the Wednesday morning swimming classes were very popular, some business girls coming as early as 8.30 a. m. W. E. Earle had very kindly paid all of the expenses of renting the tank from the Men's Association and a hearty vote of thanks was extended to him. Swimming classes will be continued each Wednesday morning in the holidays. Classes in life saving are being held to qualify for bronze and silver medals.

In gymnasium work there are well over 200 pupils enrolled. The gymnasium pupils have organized in five basketball teams for the Girls' City League and the Boosters also have a team in the league.

Vanderbilt Mansion May Be Moved Bodily to Long Island

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—The William K. Vanderbilt mansion at Fifty-second street and Fifth avenue may be re-erected as a country home on Long Island instead of being torn down, Benjamin Winter, present owner of the house, admitted. Negotiations have been begun with a wealthy resident of New York and Long Island, Mr. Win-

ter said, which may result in the mansion's being reassembled on Long Island.

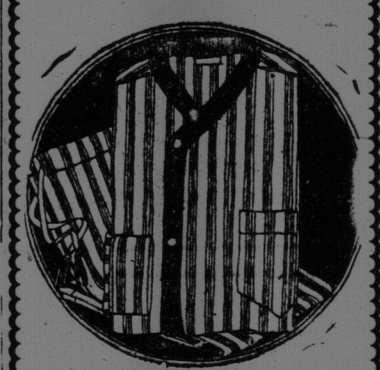
It might be possible to move the mansion in large parts or even as a whole, Mr. Winter declared. Architects are now studying the possibility of dismantling it in this manner instead of demolishing it and transporting it piecemeal, he said.

The destruction of the mansion had actually begun three weeks ago, but was halted to permit its use for charitable purposes.

A similar report was circulated about the old Cornelius Vanderbilt home at Fifty-seventh street and Fifth avenue, which was sold last spring for \$7,100,000. It was rumored for a time that that mansion, an enormous "French chateau," also would be re-erected as a summer home.

Mr. Winter acquired the Fifty-second street residence for \$4,000,000. It will be replaced by a 33-story office structure.

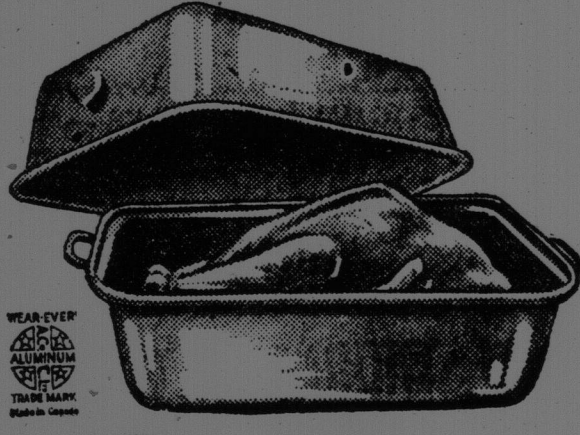
