TERRIBLE WEATHER. IE EUROPEAN CONTINENT EX-PERIENCING HEAVY SNOWS AND COLD WEATHER.

by 10 a. m. it had rained over one inch and a half. It put the streets in fearful condition; turned the sides of buildings into ice houses; and spread coating of silver over the trees, which drew the branches to the ground, and in some cases crippled the stalk for life. The trees in the squares, the old burial ground, and around the streets are loaded with ice, and many of them are in a fair way to be stripped of their branches. The telegraph and telephone wires are weighed down with a thick coating and the great numbers of these are now apparent as the network stretches out, low over the sidewalks, each single wire as large as half a dozen at ordinary times. Several of the poles have broken away and fallen, and lines have become disconnected. But line men are at work repairing the damage. The trains yesterday were late, the Quebec express due here at 9.35 a.m., not arriving here until 1.30 this morning. But the snow and ice blockade caused this, every effort being made to get through as quickly as possible.

Late evening the flangers were sent over the C. P. R. as far as Vanceboro, and up the Fredericton branch, for the purpose of cleaning out the ice. Today the trains are making good time.

In the recent heavy rain storm and floods, a great quantity of marsh hay was floated away at Musquash. The damage done in this vicinity was considerable, owing to the season's possible.


