8-hr. Workday Bill Introduced in Ontario House

Eight-hour working-day legislation was introduced into the Ontario Legislature last week by Sergt-Major J. McNamara, Soldier - Labor member for Riverdale, and M. M. Mac-Bride, Independent Labor member for South Brant.

Not only does the bill propose penalties for employers, but also for employees who work more than eight consecutive hours in one day. The fine proposed for wilful neglect to comply with the eight-hour law is \$1.000.

Exceptions to the terms of the bill are those engaged in agriculture, superintendents, foremen, time-keepers, pump, men, elevator assistants, tuaris, watchmen, hospital and nursing attendants, and those employed in work affectle ghuman life. Overtime shall be legationly in cases of necessity, and then not more than ten hours shall be worked.

The day, it is set out, chall be considered to be the 24 hours beginning at six o'clock each calendar day. Between each working day of eight hours there must be eight consecutive hours of rest.
