A SERIOUS RACE WAR.
North Carolina Citizens Boycotting the Banks and the Market Show Fight.

Eight Negroes Slain and Three White Men Wounded in a Battle This Morning.

Wilmington, N. C., Nov. 10.—The negroes not having complied with the demands of the business men by 7:30 this morning, the time fixed a column of 600 armed whites assembled at the corner of Market and Fifth streets, and at 8:30 o'clock marched to the office of the Daily Record, a negro newspaper, and destroyed all the material found in the building.

A MYSTERIOUS SHIP.
Nassau, New Providence, Nov. 10.—The steamer Aurora off Cuba Island and supposed to be abandoned cruiser Infanta Maria Theresa, is now described as being a disarmed warship flying American flag, and having been on fire and having listing slightly. The stranded ship was in an exposed position on Thursday night last.

SICKNESS AT HONOLULU.
San Francisco, Nov. 10.—The steamer Australia has arrived, seven days from Honolulu, and is quarantined. Among her passengers were thirty soldiers of the 24th regiment of the regular army, who are suffering from a sickness which has been prevalent since the outbreak of the war.

FRENCH WAR PREPARATIONS.
Paris, Nov. 10.—The Matin says that the council of admirals held yesterday it was decided to fit out all the French war vessels of the Atlantic and to reserve ships have been ordered into commission.

CANADIAN BRIEFS.

THE LORD MAYOR'S SHOW.
London, Nov. 9.—The Lord Mayor's show was favored to-day with fine weather and a large attendance of the usual crowds of people. The enthusiasm was divided between the car representing the Soudan, with the soldiers of the regiments which took part in the battle of Omdurman, and the car representing the English-speaking troops. The latter display among other things, Britannia and Columbia seated beneath a canopy, while the American flag was borne by a British sailor and the British flag was carried by an American sailor.

QUEBEC ON PROHIBITION.
Montreal, Nov. 9.—Le Soleil, replying to the W. C. T. U. resolution declaring that they would resist any attempt to direct social or moral government by laws which contain more people of ignorance and fever of broad views, says there is resentment of this statement among the French-Canadian people. "Quebec is the only sober province which did not vote for prohibition. This only province has made such a record in all the other provinces that they see no other way of eradicating the evil without the complete prohibition of alcohol."

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
