

WHY EVACUATION HAS BEEN DELAYED

RUSSIAN PRESS ON MANCHURIAN SITUATION

An Attempt to Explain Some of the Peculiarities of the Chinese Policy.

St. Petersburg, July 4.—The Vestnik Nuropp views with deep concern the fact that the foreign press is again largely inimical to Russia.

"Our policy in China scarcely justifies the reproaches which the American press is heaping upon us. We suffered incomparably more from the Chinese troubles than any of the other powers, and nevertheless we have taken far less thought of compensation and of the defence of our interests in the future than others have.

"The facilities, contradictions and uncertainties in our conduct and our declarations about the Manchurian situation can easily be traced to causes which are perfectly explicable to us, but which do not exist as far as foreign cabinets are concerned.

"Where three independent authorities are engaged one can scarcely expect uniformity and consistency in the official declarations and actions, and these are explained many peculiarities in the course of our Chinese affairs.

"The Vestnik Nuropp, however, regards the 'insolent tone of the foreign press towards Russia as due to something beyond errors of diplomacy or weakness of foreign policy."

"We have to do here," it continues, "with one of many symptoms of a deep, fundamental antagonism, for which international questions serve only as a convenient pretext. Foreign newspapers, even those which enjoy the greatest authority, more and more frequently draw unseemly parallels between Russia and Turkey, making use of a verbal material which is not customary to their press.

"The Vestnik Nuropp, however, regards the 'insolent tone of the foreign press towards Russia as due to something beyond errors of diplomacy or weakness of foreign policy."

Washington, July 4.—If the American government has been made acquainted with the latest phase of the Manchurian question, as indicated in an Odessa dispatch last night, the officials have succeeded in keeping the fact from the public.

Shanghai, July 4.—The conclusion of the American commercial treaty is only awaiting a definite reply from the Chinese, which has been delayed by the opening of the ports of Manchuria.

TWO MILLIONS AND A HALF FOR LEAD PRODUCERS

Hon. Mr. Fielding Gives Notice of a Liberal Bounty for the Miners of This Province.

(Special to the Times.)

Ottawa, July 6.—Hon. Mr. Fielding to-day gave notice of regulations authorizing the payment of \$500,000 a year for five years by way of bounties to the lead producers of British Columbia.

"1. The Governor-in-council may authorize the payment of a bounty of seventy-five cents per one hundred pounds of lead contained in lead bearing ores mined in Canada, such bounty to be paid to the producer or vendor of such ores upon evidence that such ores have been smelted in Canada, provided that the sum to be paid as such bounty shall not exceed five hundred thousand dollars in any fiscal year; provided also that

"(2) Payment of the said bounty may be made from time to time to the extent of 60 per cent. of the full bounty authorized, subject to the adjustment at the close of each fiscal year. If at the close of any year it shall appear that during the year the quantity of lead produced of which the bounty is authorized exceeds 33,330 tons, of 2,000 lbs. each, the rate of bounty shall be reduced to such sum as will bring the payments for the year within the limit mentioned in section one.

THE POPE REPORTED SLIGHTLY BETTER

WAS ABLE TO LEAVE BED THIS MORNING

The Pontiff Passed a Quiet Night and Takes Nourishment Without Difficulty.

Rome, July 6.—It appears that the condition of the Pope became suddenly worse after yesterday's drive in the Vatican gardens, notwithstanding the fact that the temperature was at 83 degrees, he caught cold and it settled in his chest and head, producing bronchial catarrh, accompanied by a slight cough, thirst, lassitude and watery eyes.

Change For Worse.

Later—the condition of the Pope showed some improvement during the day, but His Holiness became worse this evening, making it necessary for Dr. Laponi to remain at the Vatican throughout the night in order to watch his patient, who, according to the latest diagnosis, seems to have an affection of the right lung, which extends in some degree to the other organs of the thorax.

Ready For the End.

Rome, July 6.—Dr. Laponi's chief task now is the maintenance of the Pope's strength. Some improvement was indicated this afternoon by the fact that the patient was more willing to take nourishment, which was administered at short intervals and consisted chiefly of Bordeaux champagne, raw eggs and broth, but the doctor would permit the Pope to partake only in view of the fact that he has expressed a desire, as there is special danger in the possibility of increased weakness.

Telegram From Rampolla.

Ottawa, July 6.—Monsignor Sharett, the Apostolic delegate in Canada, this morning received a cablegram from Rome concerning the condition of Pope Leo XIII. The message read as follows:

To the Apostolic Delegate to Canada:

The Holy Father's condition continues serious, but is no worse. He possesses a quiet night and takes nourishment without difficulty. The clearness of his mind is perfect.

Ready For Events.

Berlin, July 4.—The Tagelblatt's Rome correspondent says: Cardinal Gregalia di Santo Stefano, the Pope's chamberlain, will prepare for the eventuality of the

death of His Holiness, in which case he will take charge temporarily of the affairs of the Church.

Great excitement is said to prevail in the Vatican.

Rome, July 6.—A bulletin issued this morning states that there is a slight improvement in the Pope's condition, the weakness of His Holiness is becoming more marked, but his breathing has become more regular. The Pontiff has left his bed.

In Vatican circles there seems to be dissatisfaction because of the slow circulation to the effect that those in authority instead of preventing the Pope from overtaxing his failing strength have, for their purposes, urged him, contrary to his positive advice, to further exertion.

"(3) If at any time it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Governor-in-council that the charges for transportation and treatment of lead ores in Canada are excessive, or that there is any discrimination which prevents the smelting of such ores in Canada on fair and reasonable terms, the Governor-in-council may authorize the payment of the bounty at such reduced rate as may be deemed just on the lead contained in such ores mixed in Canada and exported for treatment abroad.

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Rome, July 6, 1:30 p.m.—As the Pope objected to having the oxygen inhaling apparatus continually under his nostrils, Dr. Laponi arranged to impregnate the whole atmosphere of the room with oxygen. "That is much better," said the Pope. "Before I felt as though I had lost my liberty."

Although Dr. Laponi continually recommends the patient not to speak and to pay no attention to what is passing outside, the Pope generally refuses to abstain from participation in what is going on. He said to Dr. Laponi: "I shall again postpone the end. It is the will of the Almighty, nothing can change it."

The Pope wished his arm chair to be carried near his writing table, and then to the window overlooking the piazza of St. Peter. Noticing many people in the carriage, the Pope said: "The piazza looks as if it does when I am about to perform some public function."

Enjoying Sleep.

Rome, July 6, 2:45 p.m.—The Pope seemed somewhat prostrated after another exciting morning, and is now enjoying a much needed sleep.

Disturbed By Cough.

Rome, July 6, 4 p.m.—A fit of coughing disturbed the Pope's sleep. Coughing might benefit him by relieving the lungs of catarrhal obstruction, but owing to his weak state it is very trying and exhausting.

Insists on Staying Up.

Rome, July 6, 6 p.m.—Only two bulletins regarding the Pope's health will be issued daily, the doctors agreeing that there are not sufficient changes in his condition to chronicle them more often.
