Mrs. Weldon is suffering severely from the same cause. The parents, who were in an adjoining room were attracted by the children's cries and hastening to the kitchen found the little girl, clothing ablaze, and was in getting the fire out that they received the injuries. The little one was pretty badly burned, but it is believed she will recover in a short time without suffering any permanent injury.

These applications have been made in consequence of the receiver's refusal, for months past, to agree with the liquidators to the sale of the mill and lands, and to be realized upon and the mill put in operation again before its machinery and other plant shall become so deteriorated so as to materially lessen its value.
