THREE NEW FISH.

The members of the United States fish commission think they have discovered something they have just discovered. It is not that they have discovered a new species, but at the same time it is known that the sea is filled with all kinds of funny things which the scientists of the present day have never seen. Down in the historic Bahamaoan River in Virginia the members of the commission have discovered a new species of fish which they call the "tropheus globosa," quite a funny specimen of fish, which, while new, does not look at all unlike the fish which is in that part of the river near Windmill Creek. They were about one and one-quarter inches long, and were covered with minute hair-like appendages. West fishermen had been caught by a Key man, who saw it could recall ever having seen another like it. He was sure about it, either, but thought that he once had seen a similar fish in the Canary Islands, where it was known as "cabs" and a quarter inches long. The queerest of them all was found near Crawfish Bay, Key West, Fla., by Barton W. Evermann and C. Kendall.
