Resolutions Adopted by C. of E Con-istence in Toronto. (Toronto News). The views of the Church of England Conference on Education were crystal-lised into four resolutions at their closing session Wednesday afternoon. It was decided to draw up a syllabus of Hiblical lessons and to submit it to other denominations, whose aid in se-curing religious instruction in the pub-lic schools should be invited; approval of the voluntary school system was ex-pressed, and the fact emphasized that the Church of England had no desire to establish separate schools, but sim-ply to have religious instruction op-tional under the public school system. A recommendation was made in favor of an authorized manual of church doctrine and Biblical knowledge for use in the home of Anglicans. The resolutions adopted were as fol-tows: Moved by Rev. Dr. Miller, seconded by Mr. F. E. Hodgins: "That this conference recommends that a committee be appointed to draft a syllabus of lessons from the Old and New Testaments, suitable for use in the public schools of this province, such committee to be nominated by the bishop of the province. "That this syllabus be submitted to be docoraen synods at their negt see-sons for approval. "That this proval be obtained, a representative committee be appointed to confer with the other religious bodies in this province, with a view to obtaining from the co-operation in ar-ousing such public option as shall im-press upon the government the necer-sity for taking action to ensure religi-uus instruction in the public schools." The above resolution was adopted on a vote of 18 to 11. Those that follow have very little, if any, opposition. Moved by Rev. M Martin, seconded by Cancon Brown, of Parist."
