ALFIE SHRUBB TALKS OF HARD RACES AND OTHER MATTERS

Alfred Shrubb in Montreal the other
day gave a few incidents of his varied
track career. Shrubb spoke as fol-
lows:
Hard Race in Glasgow.
"The hardest race I ever ran in my
life, that I remember, was in Glasgow,
in 1902, in a ten-mile handicap against
all comers. There were some speedy
men in, and I had given away starts
that were simply ridiculous, in view of
the class of men I was going against.
Why I gave some of them as much as
ten and eleven minutes, and the sequel
showed that I had my work cut out
to beat them. There were times when
I thought it was all off, but I kept at
it and succeeded in wearing them
down, and I won by fifty yards, my
time being 50 minutes, 40 and
2-5 seconds.
Hardest Race in America.
"My hardest race in America was
that at Montreal last Thursday, but
