TUG HAS STRENUOUS TIME IN THE REVERSING FALLS

Captain of the Mabel Reid Attempted the Passage Last Night Before the Tide Served and Tug and Scows in Tow Were Caught in Swirl of Waters--The Nereid to the Rescue.

As the result of attempting the passage of the reversing falls a few minutes before the proper time of tide the tug Mabel Reid now lies in a sinking condition near the Cushing Box Mill and three scows which she had in tow are also moored there without any prospect of getting away until another tug is sent for them.

The Nereid to the Rescue. About 6:30 last evening the tug Mabel Reid with three scows was on her way down through the falls from Indiantown. At the same time the tug Nereid started up in the opposite direction with the schooner Henry H. Chamberlain, bound for Fredericton, in tow.

DIGBY MAN SEES BRIGHT FUTURE FOR HIS TOWN

W. S. Troop, Veteran Hotel Proprietor, Says Town Will be Terminus for Boston Steamship Line--C. P. R. to Build Big Hotel and Boom Tourist Travel.

SIXTY MILKMEN STILL WITHOUT LICENSES MORE HELP NEEDED FOR FRESH AIR WORK

Board of Health Decides to Prosecute -- Extension of Time Granted to Applicants -- Inspectors Submit Reports

At a meeting of the local Board of Health yesterday afternoon, the secretary was instructed to take legal action against all milkmen who have neglected to take out licenses to sell milk in the city this year. It is said that about 60 milkmen have failed to comply with the regulations in this regard.

It was decided to allow an extension of time provided the inspectors were satisfied that the delinquents were making reasonable efforts to have the work done as soon as possible.

The reports of the inspectors of backyards and alleys were received and a large amount of routine business transacted. Dr. G. G. Melvin, the medical health officer, was present, and took part in the discussions.
