R., making, on behalf of the company, a proposition looking to the solution of the question at issue between the city and the C. P. R. in connection with the West Side transfer, which it is believed will be satisfactory to the city council and enable the agreement to be completed. Mr. McNicoll writes that the company will undertake to fill in the land to be acquired by it as rapidly as the government proceeds with the construction of the docks and break water, and to complete the filling in work within a period of ten years after the government has completed its work. The government will fill in the 400 feet strip; the C. P.
