

NEW ESPERANTO NOVEL COMES OUT

Written by H. A. Snyder, Naturalized Britisher of German Parentage—Luyken Learnt in Three Weeks.

London, Mar. 13.—The third novel to be written in esperanto has just been completed by H. A. Luyken, a naturalized Britisher of German parentage. So far most of the literature accessible in Dr. Zamenhof's international language consists of translations and a good deal of interest is being taken in this attempt to make esperanto a vehicle for up to date fiction.

"Paulo Debenham" is the title of the book—a novel with a purpose—a contention that in all circumstances however strange or distressing, God is working out a wise and beneficent purpose. While incidentally attacking the Russian secret police, "Paulo Debenham" also unravels the human drama of English home missions with an intimacy of detail that caused a Russian who read the story in manuscript to say that the author had revealed the mystery of England's spiritual and moral strength.

Luyken learned esperanto in three weeks, and in spite of the fact that he is an expert linguist, finds it the easiest medium of all for the expression of his ideas. His knowledge of Russian life has been entirely gained through correspondence with subjects of the czar, whom he has never seen but with whom the wonderful new language has provided a common bond of sympathy and communication.

Although "Paulo Debenham" has yet to receive the verdict of esperantists Luyken is well into his second novel, "La Mistiko" an attempt to portray the struggle of a soul through doubt in perfect knowledge. Like its forerunner, this novel is being composed and written in trolley cars and trams and he is sometimes to be seen jotting down ideas on the Strand sidewalk.

SAID HE WAS DEAD LANDED IN JAIL

Los Angeles, Cal., Mar. 13.—John Powers, an actor, who attempted to escape his bond bill by spreading rumors that he was dead, and who persuaded a fellow actor to pretend he was an undertaker and to telegraph to the Powers home for funeral expenses, was sentenced to 30 days in jail today. According to the police, Powers owned a hotel proprietor for three weeks' bond. Unable to pay and annoyed by frequent requests to do so, Powers was said to have called to his alleged friend, who even sent flowers to the hotel proprietor. He was charged the hotel proprietor, it was reported, and later told the police the same story. They even sent flowers to the hotel, it was said. Then it was ascertained, Powers' friend, posing as an undertaker, telegraphed to Powers' home in Indiana telling of her son's alleged death and asking what should be done with the body. She responded with a request that it be cremated and the ashes sent to her. She wrote that she was sending \$75 to cover expenses.

THE "HOUN' DAWG" SONG A GERMAN LULLABY

That Houn' was Picked in Germany Back in 1499—Ozair Cradle Song Merely Refrain.

New York, N. Y., Mar. 13.—The "Houn' Dog" song may not have been born in the Ozark Mountains as the followers of Champ Clark have asserted. According to musicians here it is an old German cradle song, written prior to 1499. Here are the words in the original German: "Jedes mal ich Dorchen Komm Stossen dich Juggens mein hund herum. Mir ist's egal was sonst sie thun— Sie durfen nicht stessen mein hund herum." The literal translation is as follows: "Every time I come into the little village The boys knock my dog around. It's all the same to me what else they do— They must not kick my dog around." In a German scrap book of the 15th century the song is entitled "The Lay of the Dog," and contains several stanzas, the line sung in the Ozarks being merely the refrain. Beneath the last stanza in the scrap book are the initials, "M. J. 1499." If it was a daschund to which the song referred it was a more difficult feat to kick him around.

LADY SACKVILLE IN OLD WILL ROMANCE

Sir John Scott Leaves Her a Fortune and Second Testament—Story Resembles Novel.

London, Mar. 13.—The mystery of a missing will is, apart from the coal strike, the chief topic of conversation at the clubs and dinner parties. When Sir John Murray Scott, chairman of the board of trustees of the famous Wallace art collection, died, after a short illness, he left a large fortune and a house in Paris full of objects of art to Lady Sackville, wife and cousin of the present Lord Sackville.

People who knew Sir John were shocked when they learned private of his bequests, because for many years the testator, who was a bachelor had been carefully looked after by two devoted sisters. They thought it was cruel that these two elderly ladies had been left completely unprotected for. Soon after Sir John's death an advertisement appeared in a London paper requesting information in regard to the witnesses of a Scott will signed subsequent to 1907. What the general public does not know is the fact that a copy of a new will has actually been found. In this will Sir John evidently repented of his treatment of the devoted sisters and left about half his fortune to them and the remainder to Lady Sackville, but where the original will may be is the mystery which is causing so much gossip.

Story Resembles Novel. Meanwhile the unhappy sisters have been compelled to leave their home after paying certain duties on the estate and unless the new will can be found, Lady Sackville succeeds to the entire fortune. Lady Sackville has never been popular in society since she opposed her brother's claim to the title of the famous estate at Knowle, Kent. While her brother, Ernest Joan Baptista Sackville West, son of the diplomat by Pepita, a Spanish dancer, was attempting to prove that he was the rightful heir, his own sister was doing her best to prove her illegitimacy in order that her husband and kinship should hold the estates.

Lady Sackville is now running a curio and furniture store in South Audley street. The whole story is more like a page of a novelette. Bank Clearings. LANCASTER BOARD OF TRADE FORMED

Business Men of Fairville Opposed to Certain Phases of New Civic Charter as Affecting Lands.

There was a large and enthusiastic meeting of the business men of Fairville held in the Orange Hall in Fairville last night for the purpose of organizing a Board of Trade for the Parish of Lancaster.

W. J. Linton was elected Chairman and J. A. Donaldson secretary. A strong resolution was adopted against certain features of the new charter for the city of St. John, the management of the Lancaster lands and the water supply.

The meeting directed W. J. Linton and Glendon Allen to proceed to Fredericton to oppose parts of the City Charter bill.

An adjourned meeting will be held in the Court House, Fairville, this evening at eight o'clock when the matter will be further discussed.

The citizens of Fairville are strong against the sections of the bill to be presented to the legislature by the city and will strive hard to have them cut out.

MONTEFORT PASSENGER WAS BURIED AT SEA

Belgian Died of Asthma on from Antwerp to Canada—Steamer Had Rough Voyage—Ice Passed.

C. P. R. steamer Montfort, Captain Davidson, arrived yesterday afternoon from London and Antwerp. The steamer left Antwerp for this port on February 24th with 491 passengers, and when a few days out Sando Nicoloff, a passenger, died, after suffering with a severe attack of asthma. He was buried at sea with the usual ceremony.

Nicoloff belonged to Belgium and was on his way to Western Canada. Captain Davidson reports a very rough trip, with heavy sea and head winds. Last Sunday when the Montfort was off Cape Race she passed through field ice which was thick for miles, and the vessel had to keep well to the south, which somewhat protracted the passage to this port.

All the 490 passengers were steered and included Russian Jews, Italians, Hungarians and Belgians. The passengers went west last evening about 7:30 o'clock by a C. P. R. special.



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 21 years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must be a citizen of the Dominion of Canada. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him, his wife, brother or sister, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate city acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts, at a price of \$10 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years on the homestead and erect a house worth \$300.00.
