Closing Exercises At Horton Academy

Seating Capacity of Hall Taxed by Audience Attending 84th Anniversary Proceedings—The Prize List.

Wolfville, May 27.—The 84th anniversary of Horton Collegiate Academy was celebrated on Monday evening when the seating capacity of College Hall was fully taxed once more. Robert E. Horne, a ministerial student who hails from Prince Edward Island and comes to serve in the foreign mission field, had the distinction of reading his graduation essay on the subject "Educational Value of Missions"—an interesting and instructive composition feelingly recited.

Fred F. Fowle of Little Branch, N. B., displayed talent and much humor in his class history, while the valedictory address was delivered by a North Sydney boy, Lee H. Ingraham, in a style worthy of any of the best orators. Miss Corolla Fowles (vocalist), and Miss Dorothy Harrington (violinist), contributed to the harmony of the proceedings with music of the college quartette who came off first favorites again, being encored and gave Nellie Gray by request in response.

An exceedingly timely and fine address of national importance to Nova Scotia was delivered by Rev. Allyn King Foster, M.A., Worcester, Mass., who pleaded eloquently for a more generous treatment of secondary education which he contended with much force was of far greater importance than either the lower or the higher to which the rich philanthropists had given liberally. The Rev. Mr. Foster's address directed their attention to the very near future to the urgent needs of this academy; as to the nature of those needs the professors who are doing the holy work can tell them if consulted. What the boys and girls are made to be in the future, in twelve and twenty is what they will be through life. The Rev. F. E. Bishop, B. A., of Dartmouth, N. S., also addressed the graduates on "Faith in its Relation to Reason."

In his introductory remarks to the distribution of prizes, Principal Archibald reported that the year now closing had been the best in the academy's history. Two hundred and twenty-eight had been enrolled in all classes but as 39 were entered in two courses the net enrollment was 189, drawn from far and near—139 from Nova Scotia, 34 from New Brunswick, 3 from Prince Edward Island and the remainder from New York, Quebec, England, Maine, British Columbia, Newfoundland, Massachusetts, Saskatchewan and the West Indies. Sixty-five received diplomas and certificates of whom 13 received full matriculation diplomas.

Housemaster Howe is leaving to take up a course of study at Yale and Mr. W. H. Morton, who had resigned these vacancies will be filled by C. W. Robinson, B.A., housemaster; E. S. Foster, B.A., H. P. Lockhart and J. Ross McLean. The health of the students had been satisfactory. COMMISSION ENDS SESSION

Ottawa, May 28.—The Fishery Commission sessions concluded yesterday afternoon when Professor Prince, international commissioner for Canada and Hon. J. E. Hodges, for the United States, finished their deliberations for the time being. This commission has for three years been engaged in the work of reviewing the numerous questions relating to fisheries in the boundary waters of Canada and the United States from the Atlantic to the Pacific coasts. In the opinion of the commissioners the regulations in dispute were amongst the most vital and important of the whole series affecting as they did the great fisheries in Lake Erie, Lake Huron and Puget Sound and if the American objections were admitted by Canada there is little doubt that very serious harm would result to the Canadian fishermen and Canadian fishery resources. The position firmly adhered to by Professor Prince has been that in accordance with the treaty the regulations must be uniform on both sides of the international boundary and as required by the treaty, must be of such a nature as to protect and preserve the fish in the boundary waters.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of a valuable Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency of Sub-agency for the district, entry by proxy may be made at this agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Monthly residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. Homesteader must reside within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres. The land must be occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section of land at a homestead price of \$10 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead interest) and cultivate 20 acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter a homestead within nine miles of his homestead. Price \$20 per acre.
