



Berlin, Jan, 12, via London—An ammunition depot in the southern section of Lille, northern France; has been blown up. An official an-nouncement says that seventy persons were killed and forty injured. Considerable damage to property was done. The announcement which was contained in today's army headquar-ters statement, is as follows:


ters statement, is as follows: "In the southern walled-in section of Lille, an ammunition depot, be-longing to the Pioneer Detachment, lodged in one of the casements of a fortification, blew up. The nearby streets naturally suffered to a very considerable extent. Rescue measures taken resulted, up to last night, in the finding of seventy killed and forty injured inhabitants. The in-habitants believe the accident was due to an English attack."


