BRAZILIAN TRACTION
STRONGER

Remainder of Issues at Short Session of Montreal Market—War Bonds Firmer.

Montreal, July 4.—Except for some strength in Brazilian traction dealings, the Montreal exchange was without feature or interest. A fair demand sprang up for Canadian securities in response to the favorable rating statement for May published this morning. About 225 shares were seen here at 39 to 39 1/2, with the war bonds at 39 1/2 to 39 3/4 at a close on Tuesday.

War Bonds Firmer.

The firmer tone of Canadian war bonds continued to attract favorable attention. The third issue, which is the most active of the three, bid at 94 1/4 on transactions approximating \$50,000, par value, against the final sale Tuesday. The closing bid of 94 1/8 stood 1/8 higher for a day. The first loan continues to be marked 1/8 higher at 94 3/8, and the second at 94 1/2 against 94 on Tuesday.

Offerings have been light on recovery in the second loan and considerably less than could have been expected in case of the third in view of its persistent heaviness through the week.

Apart from Brazilian there was no movement in stock prices worth mentioning. Ogilvie Milling sold at 144 1/4 up from the last board lot transaction, although odd lots sold at high bid.

Nominal Market.

The nominal character of the market in many high grade stocks of the day is indicated in the final quotations for Ogilvie, namely 138 1/2 and 144 1/2 asked. Stocks are not offering for sale as a general thing, but the demand is backward. Steamship is 1/2 higher, at 50 1/2. Cement is 1/4 higher, at 60 3/4. These are a net decline of 3/8 for Dominion Iron comprised the net changes of the day. Iron was the only one steel stock in which business was corded, and then only one lot at 1-2. BRAZILIAN TRACTION
MAKES HIGH RECORD

Gross Earnings Show Material Increase—System Largely Controlled by Canadian Capitalists.

Toronto, July 4.—The net earnings of Brazilian Traction Company in the month of May were \$4,289,000 milreis. This is a high record for the company, exceeding the previous record made in March when earnings were \$4,151,000 milreis.

The gross earnings are showing material increase. In May they were \$5,000,000 milreis, an increase of \$800,000 over March. The record month to date and of 560,000 milreis over May of last year. The aggregate net earnings in the first five months of year were \$23,850,000 milreis, an increase of 1,359,000 milreis.

Gross Earnings for June Improved \$1,138,086 or 22 Per Cent.

Montreal, July 4.—Gross earnings of the Grand Trunk Railway for the last nine days of June amounted to \$2,104,316, as compared with \$1,786,084 in the corresponding period year ago.

The total gross for June was \$6,227,119, compared with \$5,089,033 for same month last year, an increase of \$1,138,086, or 22 per cent. The gross earnings for the month of May amounted to \$5,856,603, as compared with \$4,677,336 in the corresponding month of 1916, an increase of \$1,179,267, or 25 per cent. The earnings for the last ten days of May amounted to \$1,939,312, an increase of \$457,259, or 30.8 per cent.

COL. CORNWALLIS
WEST PASSES AWAY
Was Husband of Woman Involved in Army Scandal Last Winter.

London, July 4.—Colonel William Cornwallis West died today at Ruthin Castle, North Wales, aged 82 years. Colonel Wm. Cornwallis West was Lord Lieutenant of Denbighshire since 1872 and honorary colonel of the fourth battalion of Royal Welsh Fusiliers. He married, in 1878, the eldest daughter of Rev. Frederick Fitzpatrick and Lady Olivia, who was a daughter of the second Marquis of Headfort.

Mrs. William Cornwallis West became involved in an army scandal in January of this year. She was severely injured for her interest and subsequent antagonism to a young Irish lieutenant. The officer was promoted and then punished, largely through her influence. Field Marshal Viscount French, who was named in the report of the court of inquiry, was criticized, while Lieut. Col. Delme Radcliffe was removed from command. Col. Wm. Cornwallis West was one of the greatest land prospectors in England.
