LARGES A SYSTEM OF CREDITS TO AID FARMERS

The Report of Committee Is Tabled in House—Hon. Manning Doherty Says Govt. Will Fight Freight Rate Increase.

TORONTO, Feb. 11.—With J. W. Curry, K.C., Liberal member of the Legislature for Southeast Toronto, the speaker, the debate on the report of the committee on the Hydro-Electric Power Commission, Mr. Curry admitted that the sub-committee of the committee of the Ontario Legislature on the enforcement of the Ontario Temperance Act, which he had introduced, had been appointed to a county judge. Confidence in Drury. Mr. Curry expressed confidence in the Drury Government, and said he believed the government had acted wisely in appointing a commission to investigate the radial railway projects.

Brigadier-General Ross, Conservative, Kingston, said the Conservative members were opposed to the government giving away water powers as it was doing. As to the O. & A. General, he expressed the opinion that a man should be able to get a drink of beer if he wished to do so.

General Ross criticized the government for not having put up a stronger front against increased freight rates, express and telephone rates. The city of Toronto had done all the fighting, he said.

Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture, said the government had engaged counsel to fight the freight rates.

Rural Credits. The report of the committee on rural credits was tabled in the Legislature this afternoon. It states that "in the rural sections of Ontario the need for short term credit is felt keenly, whereas there is, in many localities, very little need for long term credit."

Dealing with New Ontario, the report states: "There are many sections where the need for mortgage or long term credit is very pronounced. In many of these cases money cannot be obtained at all by those who have land as yet of little value and are unable to raise the capital required to develop the land."

"We realize that the security which farmers in that part of the province can give is by no means so good as that of the greater credit assumed by the producers in the more advanced sections for charging a higher interest rate, but the demand for credit has been very inadequately met under the existing conditions, and this calls for the most careful consideration."

"We are justified in saying that we would be performing a valuable service to the country, to the urban population and to the farmer in providing him with a system of credit which is practical, sound, adapted particularly to his conditions."

"But in what respects is the existing credit system inadequate? It is inadequate from the point of view of agriculture."
