BOLSHEVIK FOREIGN MINISTER CLAIMS INTERNAL SITUATION OF RUSSIA IS SETTLED.

PARIS, Jan. 25.—M. Tchitcherin, the Bolsheviki foreign minister, has sent a wireless message to the Soviet representative in Sweden asking confirmation of the decision of the supreme council of the peace conference to send a mission to confer with rep-

representatives of the different factions in Russia on Prince's Islands. M. Tchitcherin's message declares that Prince's Islands are too remote for such a meeting. He objects to the isolation of the islands as tending to surround the conference with secrecy, and also to leaving to the entente the choice of participants. This proposition of the supreme

council, the message says, is made at a time when the Bolsheviki are victorious over their opponents and the internal situation of Russia has been settled, but the Soviet Government, upon receipt of the confirmation requested, will carefully consider the proposal. COMPANY WITH \$2,000,000 TO LOCATE IN DISTRICT

The acquisition in the near future by some Western Ontario town or city of a large industry employing skilled labor is likely to be the immediate result of the Government's policy of giving a bounty for the spinning of textiles from flax grown in Canada. The proposed concern, which it is said, will be capitalized at \$2,000,000, will not only take care of the present flax acreage in Western Ontario, but will develop and enlarge the flax production here, because the fiber will be retained in this country for manufacture into yarn, linen thread, or material for nets, all of which are now manufactured from Canadian fiber after it is sent abroad.

Huron, Lambton, Middlesex, Perth, and Waterloo are the chief counties in Western Ontario where flax is now produced. Since Mr. S. Frank Glass, M.P., became a father to the industry, it has grown from practically no importance to a position of great magnitude, and the action taken by the Dominion Government to stimulate increase of interest in the flax trade has had great results. The acreage has not only been increased many times over in the last few years, but by reason of the Government's atti-
