- (8) Restitution The restoration of all looted and confiscated property to its rightful owners; protection of the property, rights and interests of United Nations nationals in Japan.
- (9) Political Clauses The guarantee by Japan to protect all fundamental human rights and freedoms, and to protect foreign nationals from discrimination.

I should like to say a few words about the other members of the Canadian delegation to Canberra. As you know, Mr. K.A. Greene, the High Commissioner for Canada in Australia, has been in the diplomatic service for only a brief period; I am sure, however, that he will be very helpful in facilitating your contacts with members of the Australian Government and senior Australian officials as well as the Heads of other Commonwealth delegations. Air Commodore Godwin is, of course, well known to you. In addition to acting as your adviser on military matters, he will, I am sure, be able to secure valuable information from the military advisers of other delegations concerning their Governments views on problems of military security in the Pacific area.

Mr. E.H. Norman has been Head of the Canadian Liaison Mission in Tokyo for the past year. Mr. Norman is a distinguished Japanologist; he has lived many years in Japan, and he has achieved an international reputation for his intimate knowledge of Japanese affairs. Consequently his opinions will carry considerable weight with the other delegations. Mr. Norman has contributed some valuable memoranda on the Japanese peace settlement and these are included in an appendix to the Departmental brief.

Mr. R.E. Colling has been the alternate Canadian member on the Far Eastern Commission for nearly a year and has been associated with the work of the Commission ever since it was established. His familiarity with the work of the Commission will, I am sure, make his advice on Commission matters most helpful. He is responsible for three of the memoranda on the Far Eastern Commission which are included in an appendix to the main brief.

Mr. P, Malone, who will be acting as secretary to the delegation, has been in Australia for several years and was for some time press attache to the High Commissioner's Office. He has kept in close touch with officials of the Australian Department of External Affairs in connection with their work on the Japanese peace settlement and his experimence as press attache should be of considerable assistance to you in your relations with the press.
