

- (ii.) "I command *that you do so.*"
- (iii.) "He asked me *whether I was going.*"
- (iv.) "The woman pointed out *how just her cause was.*"

- (i.) Dependent **Statement**, (ii.) Dependent **Command**,
- (iii.) Dependent **Question**, (iv.) Dependent **Exclamation**.

II.—Adjective Clauses.

"He is not the man, *who met me.*"

"Within the hollow crown

That rounds the mortal temples of a king
Keeps death his court."

"All *I hear* is a faint tapping sound "

= All that I hear is a faint tapping sound.

"*Who steals my purse* steals trash "

= He, who steals my purse, steals trash.

"*What you stated* was proved false "

= That, which you stated, was proved false.

"I know the place *where the ghost is seen* "

= I know the place, in which the ghost is seen.

Obs.: An Adjective Clause usually begins with a Relative Pronoun, expressed or understood. Words like *where*, *why*, which sometimes introduce Adjective Clauses, are the equivalents of a Preposition and a Relative Pronoun.

III.—Adverb Clauses.

(i.) I have not seen him *since he returned* (Time).

(ii.) I am going *where he fears to follow* (Place).

(iii.) He does not write *because he is busy* (Cause).
