pages, 8 full-page illustrations, \$1.50), a clean, wholesome, quick-moving, enthralling story, a genuine "find" for all boys or friends of boys' with its welltold tales of a group of plucky Newfoundland lads.

Amongst Mussons' new novels are: The Unforeseen, by Mary Stewart Cutting (273 pages, \$1.25), in which a girl, earning her livelihood by work on a juvenile periodical in New York, to whom, at the hour when the sunset light was fading into the countless lights of the city, "it seemed as if there was always something unforeseen that might happen ". at last had "the unforeseen" come to her with a happiness different from her dreams, but greater than they had pictured. According to Maria, by Mrs. John Lane (319 pages, with 10 excellent fullpage illustrations, \$1.25), a vivacious story of the ups and downs in the progress of a social climber in London. E. Phillips Oppenheim's, The Lost Ambassador, (297 pages, \$1.25), a tale full of intrigues, circling about the attempt, almost successful, of a clever and unscrupulous Brazilian, personating his brother, a secret envoy of his Government, who is drugged and left to die in Paris, to sell, for his own profit, two battleships being built in Britain for Brazil.

Other books and booklets from Mussons are: Camping in the Forest: The Adventures of Five Children, written and illustrated by Margaret Clayton (117 pages, \$1.00); A Man's Helpers, by Wilfred T. Grenfell, M.D. (76 pages, 75c.); The Way of Prayer, by John Edgar McFadyen, D.D. (40 pages, 50c.); Morning and Evening Thoughts: For Every Day in the Year (2 vols. in box, 60c.),

The Blessing of Cheerfulness (15c.), and A Gentle Heart (15c.)—all these by J. R. Miller, D.D.; Dear Old Father, by Samuel Francis Woolard (50c).

Fleming H. Revell also sends us the 1909 and 1910 volumes of the Cole Lectures, the former, Jesus the Worker, by Charles McTyeire Bishop (240 pages), and the latter, In the School of Christ, by Bishop William Frazer McDowell (303 pages), \$1.25 net per volume. Dr. Bishop's object is to set forth the Man, Jesus, of the New Testament, especially in the "superior magnetism of His works", "the Exemplar of the loftiest ethics known to man : the Revealer to men of God and of the ways of God ". The theme is thoroughly wrought out. Bishop McDowell addresses himself to preachers. The brief and pithy table of contents indicates the line of discussion and illustration :- Chosen by the Master : I. To Hear What He Says; II. To See What He Does; III. To Leary What He Is. SENT FORTH BY THE MASTER: IV. With a Message; V. With a Programme; VI. With a Personality. The book contains in a concrete form the ideals which have evidently dominated the ministry of this conspicuously able and successful divine.

The thirty-seventh annual volume of Select Notes: A Commentary on the International Sunday School Lessons, by Rev. F. N. Peloubet, D.D., and Professor Amos R. Wells, A.M. (W. A. Wilde Company, Boston, 379 pages, \$1.25), is better than ever. Its wealth of information, suggestion and illustration make it an invaluable help to the teacher and, indeed, to students of the Bible generally.
