Yet it is better to come to church, if only on Ash-Wednesday and Good Friday, than not at all; better to do some penance and show some love of God than to neglect these virtues al-together. But how much better still it would be to now thoroughly under-stand and seriously take to heart what God requires of us, especially in this holy time, and to make it the means, as it may be more than anything else, of our final salvation!

our final salvation! First, then, to thoroughly understand what we are now to do. Everything must be well understood before it can be well done, and the keeping of Lent is no exception to this general rule. Many people break the rules of Lent because they do not clearly understand

because they do not clearly understand them. Lent, then, my dear brethren, is not a time to be spent in penance altogether scoording to one's own devotion. Far from it; the duties to be preformed in it are clearly and precisely laid down and abould be attended to very strictly. They are not many; they make no great demand on our time or strength; but the Ohristian who discharges them properly will make his Lent far better than one would who should neglect them and take any other practices, no matter how hard, in their place. It is better to keep the real rules or laws of Lent faithfully than to hear three Masses every day, and come to all the extra services, and give half one's goods to the poor, and yet neglect our regular duties.




